Written by Paul in 57 AD
Paul's longest letter (7,114 words)


· Sixth of the 13 letters attributed to Paul

· He had yet to visit the church in Rome

He hoped to visit Rome on his way to Spain
His best laid plans went awry, and his 1st visit was in chains
He was martyred during his 2nd visit (64-68 AD)

Roman church was already well-established
No one knows how the church began (Acts 2:10)
Romans mentioned 26 individuals and two families

· Phoebe delivered the letter to the church at Rome

Romans 1:1-7: The Main Players

- · Paul
 - Known throughout the Roman Empire as an apostle, evangelist, and church planter
 - Arguably the most influential person in the New Testament other than Jesus
- · The Roman Church
 - · Jewish and Gentile believers
 - Fractures over non-essentials

Romans 1:1-7: Setting the • Romans 1-11 establish doctrine

- - · Our inability to save ourselves through the Law & our need for a Savior

 - God's sacrifice of Jesus on the cross to justify us
 Our acceptance of Jesus as Lord and Savior and the beginning of sanctification
 - · God's promise to Israel and how the Gentiles are integral to that promise
 - · The goal: a unified Roman church!

· How we are to conduct ourselves as citizens under authority

How we are to treat a struggling brother or sister
How to have the same attitude toward each other that Christ has toward us

Romans 1:1-7

Paul, a servant of Christ Jesus, called to be an apostle and set apart for the gospel of God—the gospel he promised beforehand through his prophets in the Holy Scriptures regarding his Son, who as to his earthly life was a descendant of David, and who through the Spirit of holiness was appointed the Son of God in power by his resurrection from the dead: Jesus Christ our Lord. Through him we received grace and apostleship to call all the Gentiles to the obedience that comes from faith for his name's sake. And you also are among those Gentiles who are called to belong to Jesus Christ. To all in Rome who are loved by God and called to be his holy people: Grace and peace to you from God our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ.

Observations

· Paul knew his new identity (Romans 1:1)

• Philippians 3:5-9

Paul knew the prophecies were fulfilled in Christ (Romans 1:2-4)
Acts 13:26-33

· Paul knew his mission (Romans 1:5-6)

· Acts 9:15

· Paul greeted fellow believers the same way

· "Grace and peace to you from God our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ"

Paul ordered the words in his greeting to have spiritual significance to the church
Greetings in letters were customary, but he infused his with Christian character
