



5-Day Bible Reading Plan: Go With Me

Day 1: The Commission to Go Together

Reading: Matthew 28:16-20

Devotional: Jesus' final command wasn't just about going—it was about going together. He didn't send His disciples alone; He promised His presence "even to the end of the age." The Great Commission isn't a solo mission but a shared journey. Notice Jesus said to make disciples of "all nations," breaking down every barrier of exclusivity. Your calling isn't to have all the answers or to have arrived at perfection. Your calling is to follow Jesus and invite others to walk alongside you. Who has God placed in your life to journey with? Don't wait until you feel qualified. Jesus qualifies the called, not the other way around. Today, ask someone: "Will you go with me?"

Reflection: Who in your life needs you to say, "Go with me" as you both follow Jesus?

Day 2: Sent Out Two by Two

Reading: Luke 10:1-12

Devotional: Jesus sent seventy disciples ahead of Him—not alone, but two by two. He sent them as "lambs among wolves," vulnerable yet powerful because they carried His message. This reveals a profound truth: ministry isn't about self-sufficiency but shared courage. The four lepers in 2 Kings 7 understood this. Facing certain death from

famine, they reasoned, "Why sit here until we die?" Their shared desperation became shared deliverance. They went together and discovered the enemy had fled. Your breakthrough may require you to stop isolating and start connecting. Find your two, your three, your four. The weight of the calling becomes lighter when carried together. God amplifies our small steps into mighty victories.

Reflection: What fear or challenge are you facing alone that requires companionship?

Day 3: Faith in the Unknown

Reading: Hebrews 11:8-16

Devotional: Abraham led his family to a place he'd never been. Noah built for weather he'd never seen. The heroes of faith didn't lead from personal arrival—they led by following God. This challenges the modern idea that leaders must "have it all together" before they can guide others. Biblical leadership is about following Jesus first, then inviting others to follow Him with you. You don't need a complete map; you need a faithful Guide. When you say, "I can't take you somewhere I haven't been," you make yourself the source instead of God. But when you say, "Come with me as I follow Christ," you point to the true Source. Your uncertainty doesn't disqualify you—it positions you to trust God more deeply.

Reflection: Where is God asking you to step out in faith without knowing the full destination?

Day 4: The Power of Companionship

Reading: Ecclesiastes 4:9-12

Devotional: "Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their labor." Scripture consistently emphasizes partnership: Moses and Aaron, Joshua and Caleb, David and Jonathan, Ruth and Naomi, Paul and Silas. God rarely calls us to go it alone. Even Jesus had His inner circle of three and His twelve disciples. There's strength in numbers, not because we're weak, but because God designed us for community. When one falls, the other lifts them up. When one grows weary, the other provides strength. The Christian journey isn't a solo expedition—it's a caravan of faith. Who are your four? Your three? Your dynamic duo? Identify them and commit to walking together through this season.

Reflection: Who can you reach out to today to strengthen your spiritual companionship?

Day 5: Go With Me—A Declaration of Faith

Reading: John 14:1-6

Devotional: When the disciples asked Jesus where He was going and how they'd know the way, He answered, "I am the way, the truth, and the life." There is no map for following Jesus—only the Person. "Go with me" isn't a request born from having everything figured out; it's an invitation born from shared courage and faith. Whether you say it as a vulnerable question—"Will you go with me?"—or as a confident declaration—"Go with me!"—both require trust. Jesus invites us into both the vertical relationship with Him and the horizontal relationship with each other. This year, let the spirit of "go" rise within you. Get up from places of stagnation, depression, and fear. Link hands with fellow believers and move forward together into all God has for you.

Reflection: What is one bold step of faith you need to take this week, and who will you invite to go with you?

Closing Prayer: *Lord Jesus, thank You for never leaving us alone. As we follow You, help us to invite others into this journey. Give us courage to step into the unknown, trusting that You are the Way. Strengthen our partnerships, deepen our faith, and use us to make disciples of all nations. We go because You go with us. In Jesus' name, Amen.*
