SERMON NOTES



This week's sermon Man and Woman Genesis 2:18-25

Four macro-observations from the creation of man and woman:

- 1. There is only one race.
- 2. There are only two sexes.
- 3. Marriage was instituted before all other human institutions.
 - a. Family creation is a primary purpose of man on earth.
 - b. God locks sex into the confines of marriage, for procreation and pleasure.
- 4. Marriage has a spiritual corollary that is eternal.

Applications:

- The church must always strive to be more family than social club.
- Christians should run from sexual sins—porn, adultery, prostitution, and fornication.
- Marriage should be held in high esteem.
- Reject the world's values when it comes to being wives and mothers, husbands and fathers.
- We must reach out to the hurting and harassed.

Digging Deeper into the Message

Pastor Mike spoke about the church being more of a family. Reflect on this as we look into some scriptures that examine this further.

Read Mark 3:31-35. How would Jesus' words have been shocking in the culture of that time?

What implications does that have for his followers both then and now?

How is the concept of the church as a family described in Romans 12:3-5?

What does this connectedness look like in your life?

What does Paul indicate was the cost Jesus paid to give us unity and belonging in 1 Corinthians 10:15-17?

Read 1 Corinthians 12:12-27.

What does this say about the value of individuals? How is a community described? What dignity is given to those who seem weaker? How can we practically apply this?

Read Ephesians 2: 11-22. How are we brought near to God?

What value, then, should be placed on our reconciliation to God?

How then should we value unity?

What metaphor does Paul use to describe the household of God?

How can we encourage each other to live more as a family?

"The early Christians did their best to live as an extended family, caring for each other in the way in which (in that world) extended families did. They called each other "brother" and "sister" and really meant it. They lived and prayed and thought like that: children of the same father, following the same older brother, sharing goods and resources where need arose. When they talked about "love," that's the main thing they meant: living as a single family, a mutually supporting community. The church must never forget that calling." - N.T. Wright, *Simply Christian*

- What are some things that can help keep us away from sexual sin?
- How can we support healthy marriages?
- What differences do you see in the world's expectations of family roles and what we see in the Bible?
- Reaching out to the hurting with dignity, compassion and offers of inclusion is part of Jesus' mission how are we doing this?
