Signs of Dying on the Vine

Lust of the flesh, lust of the eyes, the pride of life.

1 John 2:15-17

New Living Translation

15 Do not love this world nor the things it offers you, for when you love the world, you do not have the love of the Father in you. 16 For the world offers only a craving for physical pleasure, a craving for everything we see, and pride in our achievements and possessions. These are not from the Father, but are from this world. 17 And this world is fading away, along with everything that people crave. But anyone who does what pleases God will live forever.

American Mall Parking Lot Testimony

John 15:1-8

New Living Translation

15 "I am the true grapevine, and my Father is the gardener.

- Jesus is the source of life to those that belong to/abide in Him.
- God the Father cares for the grapevine and the branches and receives glory when there is much fruit.

2 He cuts off every branch of mine that doesn't produce fruit, and he prunes the branches that do bear fruit so they will produce even more.

Dying on the vine:

- Where there is no fruit there is no L.I.F.E
- Where there's no life there's no nutrients.

3 You have already been pruned and purified by the message I have given you. 4 Remain in me, and I will remain in you. For a branch cannot produce fruit if it is severed from the vine, and you cannot be fruitful unless you remain in me.

Dying on the vine:

 Only the word of God brings the nutrients we need to produce fruit. If we remove ourselves from the study of, and obedience to the word we're in danger of being severed from the vine.

5 "Yes, I am the vine; you are the branches. Those who remain in me, and I in them, will produce much fruit. For apart from me you can do nothing.

Dying on the vine:

• Those who remove themselves from close fellowship with the word will find it impossible to accomplish anything purpose related which glorifies God.

6 Anyone who does not remain in me is thrown away like a useless branch and withers. Such branches are gathered into a pile to be burned.

Dying on the vine:

• If you leave your first love, and return to the lust of this world we are thrown away and gathered to be burned.

7 But if you remain in me and my words remain in you, you may ask for anything you want, and it will be granted! 8 When you produce much fruit, you are my true disciples. This brings great glory to my Father.

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• The key to personal revival is to recognize that you've separated yourself from the King, the Vine, the source of life. The study of, and obedience to the word of God activates faith and propels you towards a fruitful purpose.

Producing the Lord's Fruit

Philippians 1:9-11

New Living Translation

9 I pray that your love will overflow more and more, and that you will keep on growing in knowledge and understanding. 10 For I want you to understand what really matters, so that you may live pure and blameless lives until the day of Christ's return. 11 May you always be filled with the fruit of your salvation—the righteous character produced in your life by Jesus Christ[a]—for this will bring much glory and praise to God.

• If the Lord's fruit is in us it means we'll have His character as well.

Mephibosheth Revived/ 10 Steps of Revival

1. Recognizing the royal source of love, goodness, kindness, and power.

Mephibosheth - grandson of King Saul, Israel's first king. Son of Jonathan David's best friend.

Revelation 19:11-16

New Living Translation

The Rider on the White Horse

11 Then I saw heaven opened, and a white horse was standing there. Its rider was named Faithful and True, for he judges fairly and wages a righteous war. 12 His eyes were like flames of fire, and on his head were many crowns. A name was written on him that no one understood except himself. 13 He wore a robe dipped in blood, and his title was the Word of God. 14 The armies of heaven,

Hebrews 8 New Living Translation Christ Is Our High Priest

8 Here is the main point: We have a High Priest who sat down in the place of honor beside the throne of the majestic God in heaven. 2 There he ministers in the heavenly Tabernacle,[a] the true place of worship that was built by the Lord and not by human hands.

3 And since every high priest is required to offer gifts and sacrifices, our High Priest must make an offering, too. 4 If he were here on earth, he would not even be a priest, since there already are priests who offer the gifts required by the law. 5 They serve in a system of worship that is only a copy, a shadow of the real one in heaven. For when Moses was getting ready to build the Tabernacle, God gave him this warning: "Be sure that you make everything according to the pattern I have shown you here on the mountain."[b]

3. A separation, whether real or perceived, from the abundance of life, caused by the thief Satan.

Saul and Jonathan were killed and battle and Mephibosheth was crippled and separated from the royal life he once knew.

How does Satan separate us? By persuading us to disconnect ourselves from faith.

Luke 22:31-32

New Living Translation

31 "Simon, Simon, Satan has asked to sift each of you like wheat. 32 But I have pleaded in prayer for you, Simon, that your faith should not fail. So when you have repented and turned to me again, strengthen your brothers."

- One sure sign that we need revival is our denial of Jesus. It's not that we say we don't know Him, rather we deny doing the things that grow the relationship.
- When we fail to live by faith our spiritual life diminishes. What began in faith must remain in faith.
- Repentance leads to revival, causes us to turn to Him, then we turn to our brothers. The love cycle.

How does Satan separate us? By persuading us to disconnect ourselves from faith.

1 Peter 5:8-9

New Living Translation

8 Stay alert! Watch out for your great enemy, the devil. He prowls around like a roaring lion, looking for someone to devour. 9 Stand firm against him, and be strong in your faith. Remember that your family of believers[a] all over the world is going through the same kind of suffering you are.

4. A reunion between the victim and the victor.

2 Samuel 9:3-5

New Living Translation

Lo Debar (or Lo-debar) is a town only mentioned a few times in Scripture. If it is, as many scholars assume, the same town as Debir, mentioned several times in the book of Joshua, we find that it was one of the cities of Canaan that Joshua destroyed (Joshua 10:39). Debir, whose name means "pasture" or "sheepfold," was located near the Valley of Achor (Joshua 15:7) on the northern boundary of Judah, somewhere between Jerusalem and Jericho. The exact location of the town is impossible to ascertain. If Lo Debar is the same town as Debir, somewhere in its history the name was changed to Lo Debar.

Debar normally means "word" or "thing." The prefix lo is a negator; thus, the term Lo Debar would mean "no word" or "no thing." The town's name is not complimentary. The name may or may not have been an apt description of the town. If it was an apt description, it may have been lacking good pasture, or it may have been an insignificant, "nothing town." In English we might say that it was "in the middle of nowhere."

Lo Debar is first mentioned in connection with Mephibosheth, the only surviving son of Jonathan, son of King Saul. David wanted to show kindness to Jonathan's family, and he was told that Mephibosheth was living in Lo Debar. The story is found in 2 Samuel 9. Mephibosheth leaves "Nothingville" (Lo Debar) and moves into the king's residence in Jerusalem—from Podunk to palace.

Again we see here that he lived in a town that represented a place with "no word", no fruit, no pastures.

James 4:7-10

New Living Translation

5. Surrender and reverence to the Reviver.

Esther 2:12-14

New Living Translation

12 Before each young woman was taken to the king's bed, she was given the prescribed twelve months of beauty treatments—six months with oil of myrrh, followed by six months with special perfumes and ointments. 13 When it was time for her to go to the king's palace, she was given her choice of whatever clothing or jewelry she wanted to take from the harem. 14 That evening she was taken to the king's private rooms, and the next morning she was brought to the second harem,[a] where the king's wives lived. There she would be under the care of Shaashgaz, the king's eunuch in charge of the concubines. She would never go to the king again unless he had especially enjoyed her and requested her by name.

Esther 4:15-16

New Living Translation

15 Then Esther sent this reply to Mordecai: 16 "Go and gather together all the Jews of Susa and fast for me. Do not eat or drink for three days, night or day. My maids and I will do the same. And then, though it is against the law, I will go in to see the king. If I must die, I must die.

Esther had the finest of everything but yet was still willing to die.

2 Samuel 9:1-8

New Living Translation

David's Kindness to Mephibosheth

9 One day David asked, "Is anyone in Saul's family still alive—anyone to whom I can show kindness for Jonathan's sake?" 2 He summoned a man named Ziba, who had been one of Saul's servants. "Are you Ziba?" the king asked.

"Yes sir, I am," Ziba replied.

3 The king then asked him, "Is anyone still alive from Saul's family? If so, I want to show God's kindness to them."

Ziba replied, "Yes, one of Jonathan's sons is still alive. He is crippled in both feet."

4 "Where is he?" the king asked.

"In Lo-debar," Ziba told him, "at the home of Makir son of Ammiel."

5 So David sent for him and brought him from Makir's home. 6 His name was Mephibosheth[a]; he was Jonathan's son and Saul's grandson. When he came to David, he bowed low to the ground in deep respect. David said, "Greetings, Mephibosheth."

Mephibosheth replied, "I am your servant."

7 "Don't be afraid!" David said. "I intend to show kindness to you because of my promise to your father, Jonathan. I will give you all the property that once belonged to your grandfather Saul, and you will eat here with me at the king's table!"

8 Mephibosheth bowed respectfully and exclaimed, "Who is your servant, that you should show such kindness to a dead dog like me?"

Mephibosheth's meeting with the King was much different than Esther's. Esther had the best of everything and was willing to die. Mephibosheth had nothing and already considered himself dead. "Say, Revival!"

- Esther walked in as a queen and Mephibosheth was crippled in both feet.
 How are you walking today?
- Esther lived in royalty, Mephibosheth lived in obscurity. Are you thriving or just surviving? Are you in the palace or the pit?
- Esther had the best of everything and was willing to die. Mephibosheth had nothing and already considered himself dead. Esther was willing to sacrifice herself to save her people. Mephibosheth considered himself dead because his family and dreams already were.
- Esther presented her best self to the King. Mephibosheth could only surrender himself as He was, broken and brokenhearted.

Proverbs 13:12

New Living Translation

12 Hope deferred makes the heart sick,
but a dream fulfilled is a tree of life.

- Mephibosheth was five when his father and grandfather were killed. He was crippled in his childhood. How old were you?
- It may have been 16 years before Prince Mephibosheth encountered someone from the royalty from which he came. How long have you been waiting?
- The King sent His word for Mephibosheth to be brought from Lodebar, a
 place with no word, no life, no hope. Have you received a word? Are you
 saved but still awaiting total salvation in your life?

Hebrews 3:12-19

New Living Translation

12 Be careful then, dear brothers and sisters.[a] Make sure that your own hearts are not evil and unbelieving, turning you away from the living God. 13 You must

warn each other every day, while it is still "today," so that none of you will be deceived by sin and hardened against God. 14 For if we are faithful to the end, trusting God just as firmly as when we first believed, we will share in all that belongs to Christ. 15 Remember what it says:

"Today when you hear his voice, don't harden your hearts as Israel did when they rebelled."[b]

The worst place to meet a king

Luke 23:32-43

New Living Translation

32 Two others, both criminals, were led out to be executed with him. 33 When they came to a place called The Skull,[a] they nailed him to the cross. And the criminals were also crucified—one on his right and one on his left.

34 Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they don't know what they are doing."[b] And the soldiers gambled for his clothes by throwing dice.[c]

35 The crowd watched and the leaders scoffed. "He saved others," they said, "let him save himself if he is really God's Messiah, the Chosen One." 36 The soldiers mocked him, too, by offering him a drink of sour wine. 37 They called out to him, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" 38 A sign was fastened above him with these words: "This is the King of the Jews."

39 One of the criminals hanging beside him scoffed, "So you're the Messiah, are you? Prove it by saving yourself—and us, too, while you're at it!"

40 But the other criminal protested, "Don't you fear God even when you have been sentenced to die? 41 We deserve to die for our crimes, but this man hasn't done anything wrong." 42 Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your Kingdom."

43 And Jesus replied, "I assure you, today you will be with me in paradise."

- There's a good chance that the thieves were also naked and publically shamed. Are you willing to surrender your hurt, sin, and shame? Are you willing to show him how much Satan has punished you so He can prepare you for paradise?
- Why are we so afraid to present our sin and shame to the King?

1 John 4:16-18

New Living Translation

16 We know how much God loves us, and we have put our trust in his love.

God is love, and all who live in love live in God, and God lives in them. 17 And as we live in God, our love grows more perfect. So we will not be afraid on the day of judgment, but we can face him with confidence because we live like Jesus here in this world.

18 Such love has no fear, because perfect love expels all fear. If we are afraid, it is for fear of punishment, and this shows that we have not fully experienced his perfect love.

8 Mephibosheth bowed respectfully and exclaimed, "Who is your servant, that you should show such kindness to a dead dog like me?"

8. A royal command setting revival in place.

9 Then the king summoned Saul's servant Ziba and said, "I have given your master's grandson everything that belonged to Saul and his family. 10 You and your sons and servants are to farm the land for him to produce food for your master's household.[b] But Mephibosheth, your master's grandson, will eat here at my table." (Ziba had fifteen sons and twenty servants.)

- 9. Obedience to the command.
- 11 Ziba replied, "Yes, my lord the king; I am your servant, and I will do all that you have commanded."
 - 10. Revived to forever be connected to and in the company of the giver of life.

And from that time on, Mephibosheth ate regularly at David's table,[c] like one of the king's own sons.

12 Mephibosheth had a young son named Mica. From then on, all the members of Ziba's household were Mephibosheth's servants. 13 And Mephibosheth, who was crippled in both feet, lived in Jerusalem and ate regularly at the king's table.
