Theme: We continue our series on the Epistle of 1 Peter, entitled "Temporary Residents in a Foreign Land." This morning we will be considering another section of the opening chapter, this one consisting of five memorable verses. Here Peter reflects on the improbable fact that persons who had never physically encountered Jesus nonetheless believe in Him, love Him, and are willing to pay a price for following Him. Perhaps the most remarkable aspect of all of this is the deep joy they experience in the midst of their ordeal. Clearly, this emotional aspect of their experience is essential to the resiliency of their faith.

Takeaway: There is an emotional dimension to resilient faith, the kind of faith that survives adversity. This emotional aspect is characterized preeminently by joy. This joy is a foretaste—an anticipation, a sneak preview, if you will—of what awaits us when we finally cross the goal-line of our life journey. As with Christ, so with us: first the cross, then the glory. There is more to such joyful faith than subjective feelings, however. Such faith is anchored in the inspired testimony of centuries-old Scripture.
