

Central Idea: God is focused on internal matters of the heart, not outward appearances. Money and giving reveal the state of our heart as few things do.

- 3. What made the poor widow's tiny gift greater in Jesus' eyes than the large sums of money given by the wealthy? How can we give in this way?
- 4. If someone came to you for advice saying they only had \$10 to their name and they felt God wanted them to put it in the offering at church, what would you say?
- 5. What keeps us from giving sacrificially as this widow clearly did?

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2. Revelation brings greater responsibility




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A poor widow came and put in two lepta, which equals a quadrans
