Main Point: To show the nature of true praise.

True praise is:

1. A gift from God (41, 46; John 3:27; James 1:17; 1 Corinthians 4:7; Luke 11:11-13)

2. Saturated by God's Word (42-43, 45, 46-55, 32-33; John 16:8; 2 Peter 1:21)
