“If your brother or sister sins against you, rebuke them; and if they repent, forgive them. Even if they sin against you seven times in a day and seven times come back to you saying, ‘I repent,’ you must forgive them.” Luke 17:3,4 (NIV)

If we have been harmed by someone we are in relationship with, we must let them know.

“Do not hate a fellow Israelite in your heart. Rebuke your neighbor frankly so you will not share in their guilt. Do not seek revenge or bear a grudge against anyone among your people, but love your neighbor as yourself. I am the Lord.” Leviticus 19:17,18 (NIV)

If we have done damage to a relationship, we must humbly apologize.

Five Elements of Effective Apologies

S – Say sorry! Express regret. Feel it to Heal it!

N – Name it and claim it! Take responsibility.

O – Offer yourself and your services. Make amends. Pay to play!

R – Reset the bar. Set and say your intention moving forward. Whatever offense, we –

End it to mend it!

E – Entreat. Earnestly Ask - Ask forgiveness. Plea to be free!

Forgiveness is precious, and it is a process.

Decisional forgiveness gets us started; emotional forgiveness occurs over time.

Forgiveness frees us.

“What if Joseph holds a grudge against us and pays us back for all the wrongs we did to him?” This is what you are to say to Joseph: “I ask you to forgive your brothers the sins and the wrongs they committed in treating you so badly. Now please forgive the sins of the servants of the God of your father.” And Joseph wept when they spoke to him. His brothers then came and threw themselves down before him. “We are your slaves,” they said. Joseph said to them, “Don’t be afraid. Am I in the place of God? You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives.” Genesis 50:15-20 (NIV)
