Sermon At a Glance

Hezekiah's revival in 2 Chronicles 30–31 shows that when God's people stop overestimating their own strength and return to Him in humility, repentance, and worship, He brings renewal, joy, and blessing. Revival begins with a call back to God, is marked by sincere confession, and results in transformed lives of obedience and generosity.

Our Own Strength

During Sundays message we learned that Revival can't be experienced as long as we are living in our own strength and are lifted up in our own knowledge. What does that mean?

Tear Down

When revival came, people didn't just feel sorry for sin, they acted by removing idols (2 Chron. 31:1). What "idols" or distractions might God be asking you to tear down in your own life today?

Against God

Why do you think some people mocked Hezekiah's call to return to God (2 Chron. 30:10), while others humbled themselves (2 Chron. 30:11)? How does this tension reflect the way people still respond to God's Word today?

Obedience And Blessing

In 2 Chronicles 31:20–21, Hezekiah prospered because he sought God wholeheartedly. How does this echo Joshua 1:7–8 and Psalm 1:1–3? What do these passages together teach about obedience, blessing, and spiritual prosperity?

Revival & Generosity

Revival led the people to generosity in giving (2 Chron. 31:5–10). How does a revived heart change the way we view our finances, possessions, and generosity toward God's work?

Generosity Observed

Have you known or observed someone who you believed genuinely loved God and was generous? Please explain why you think that?

Be Specific

Revival required action—tearing down idols, giving offerings, and recommitting to obedience. What's one specific step you could take this week to tear down an idol?

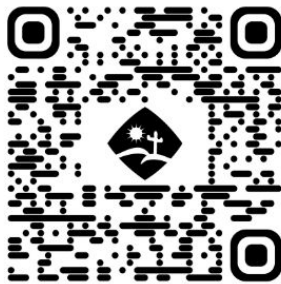

John and Cathy Honeycutt—World in Need Baptist Mission
