W Consider Your Impact

While family and friends may put pressure on individuals to pursue marriage, the apostle Paul encourages individuals to consider how they can best use their lives in service of Christ. In some cases, remaining single allows for greater dedication to Christian ministry and should be encouraged and celebrated within the life of the church.

- 1. Read 1 Corinthians 7:25-31. Paul urges us to have an undivided devotion to the Lord. He reminds us that it's ministry that matters most, not marriage.
 - When you keep your heart set on eternity, how does that impact your perspective on marriage, emotions, possessions and success? (vs. 29-31)
 - Does the way you spend your time point to an undivided devotion to God?
 In what ways?
- 2. Read 1 Corinthians 7:32-35. Here Paul is elevating and esteeming singleness because it *can* make it easier to have an undivided devotion to the Lord.
 - In what ways can marriage make it more difficult to have an undivided devotion to God?
 - Being single doesn't guarantee an undivided devotion. In what ways can singles struggle to have an undivided devotion to God?
 - If you're single currently, do you see it as an opportunity to serve the Lord with less distractions? How could you take advantage of this opportunity?
- 3. Read 1 Corinthians 7:36-40. Here Paul addresses two specific situations one of an engaged man and one of a woman who has lost her husband. Both are free to marry again, but Paul thinks it would be "even better" (vs. 38) or "happier" (vs. 40) for them to stay single.
 - Pastor Josh encouraged anyone who is single to first consider this question before getting married – will getting married allow me to have greater kingdom impact than staying single? In what ways does this question go against our culture? In what ways could it impact the way we view singleness and singles?
- 4. As we enter this Advent season, in what practical ways could you focus your devotion more fully on Christ?
