Opening: When you were growing up, what authority figure was hard for you to respect? Why?

Read | Peter 2:13-3:7

- 1. What is the main command of these verses? (Hint: it's the first word.) How does this passage relate to the previous verse (I Peter 1:12)?
- 2. What specific examples of submission does Peter cite in this passage? How difficult are these situations?
- 3. To what extent does Peter call Christians to submit? To whom should we submit? (1 Peter 2:13, 17)

Does this excuse us from submitting to authorities who make bad decisions? If there is ever an exception for us to not submit, what would it be? (Acts 4:18–20)

- 4. What are the reasons Peter gives for Christians to submit?
 - 2:15: Submit yourselves ... so that you can do what?
 - 2:18–19: Slaves, submit to your masters ... because it is what before God?
 - 3:1: Wives, submit to husbands ... so that what can happen?
 - 3:7: Husbands, in the same way ... so that what will not be hindered?
- 5. How is Jesus an example of submission to us? (2:21–23; Philippians 2:5–8) In what way can submitting like Christ ...

be a source of power in your life? be a witness to the lost in our world?

- 6. How can Jesus' example help when you face hardships you can't change?
- 7. What authorities are over you? How do you apply verses 16–17 in those relationships?
