Matthew 6:1-4

Opener: What is the nicest thing anyone has ever done for you?

Read Matthew 6:1–4

- 1. Why do people do good deeds in front of others?
- 2. What are ways we pursue recognition? What are some examples of things we might do in front of others in order to get recognition?
- 3. Do you think more good deeds are done in private or in public?
- 4. How is this teaching countercultural to what the world teaches?
- 5. Is it possible to hide every good thing you do? What is the key principle to learn from Jesus' teaching on this?
- 6. How do you reconcile Matthew 5:16 and this teaching to do good in secret?
- 7. Read Matthew 25:34–40. Jesus provides examples of how to "do mercy" sacrificially. What does this look like for you personally in today's world?
- 8. In AD 242, the bishop Cyprian rallied Christians during an epidemic and said, "If we're going to do what Jesus did, so that through His poverty we might become rich, I call you to give personal and financial aid, care and comfort to all according to their need, not their faith." How can this be applied today?
- 9. Rather than live for recognition and reward now, what are some ways you can "do mercy" for your future reward?
- 10. Discuss with your group needs in your community and how as a group or individually you can meet those needs.
