## Who Do You Think You Are? Discovering Our New Identity

1. Your identity is controlling your life.

**Proverbs 23:7 (NKJV)** For as a man thinks in his heart, so is he.

2. There's power in knowing who you are.

**1 Corinthians 15:9–10 (ESV)** <sup>9</sup> For I am the least of the apostles, unworthy to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. <sup>10</sup> But by the grace of God I **am what I am**, and his grace toward me was not in vain.

## John 1:19-23 (NIV)

<sup>19</sup> Now this was John's testimony when the Jewish leaders in Jerusalem sent priests and Levites to ask him who he was. <sup>20</sup> He did not fail to confess, but confessed freely, "I am not the Messiah."

<sup>21</sup> They asked him, "Then who are you? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not."

"Are you the Prophet?" He answered, "No."

<sup>22</sup> Finally they said, "Who are you? Give us an answer to take back to those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?"

<sup>23</sup> John replied in the words of Isaiah the prophet, "I am the voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way for the Lord.'"

3. Everything that holds you back in life, that restricts you, that limits you, finds its root in a lie about your identity.

**2 Corinthians 10:3–5 (ESV)** <sup>3</sup> For though we walk in the flesh, we are not waging war according to the flesh. <sup>4</sup> For the weapons of our warfare are not of the flesh but have divine power to destroy strongholds. <sup>5</sup> We destroy arguments and every lofty opinion raised against the knowledge of God, and take every thought captive to obey Christ,

**Judges 6:12 (ESV)** And the angel of the Lord appeared to him and said to him, "The Lord is with you, O mighty man of valor."

**Judges 6:15 (ESV)** <sup>1</sup>And he said to him, "Please, Lord, how can I save Israel? Behold, my clan is the weakest in Manasseh, and I am the least in my father's house."

4. We are who God says we are and has made us to be in Christ.

**2 Corinthians 5:14–16 (NLT)** <sup>14</sup> Since we believe that Christ died for all, we also believe that we have all died to our old life. <sup>15</sup> He died for everyone so that those who receive his new life will no longer live for themselves. Instead, they will live for Christ, who died and was raised for them. <sup>1</sup>

<sup>6</sup>So we have stopped evaluating others from a human point of view. At one time we thought of Christ merely from a human point of view. How differently we know him now!

2 Corinthians 5:17–21 (ESV) <sup>17</sup> Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come. <sup>18</sup> All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; <sup>19</sup> that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. <sup>20</sup> Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. <sup>21</sup> For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

**Ephesians 4:22–24 (NET)** <sup>22</sup> You were taught with reference to your former way of life to lay aside the old man who is being corrupted in accordance with deceitful desires, <sup>23</sup> to be renewed in the spirit of your mind, <sup>24</sup> and to put on the new man who has been created in God's image—in righteousness and holiness that comes from truth.
