'Getting Along While You Belong': Fighting Against Dissension in Your Church in the Age of Individualism, Preference and Hostility.

I. Getting Along - A challenging matter, even in New Testament times.

- a. Acts 6: Christians from the same ethnic group, but from different backgrounds.
- b. Acts 15:1-29: Christians from the same ethnic group and language, but with disagreements over doctrine.
- c. Acts 15:36-40: Christians from the same ethnic group, language, and doctrine, but with disagreements over ministry specifics.
- d. 1 Corinthians 1:10-17; 6:1-8; 11:18-22: Christians from different ethnic groups, language, and social status.
- e. Galatians 2:11-14: Two Christian men from the same ethnic group and language, but with disagreements over doctrine and ministry specifics.
- f. Philippians 4:2-3: Two Christian ladies from the same church, of unknown background.
- g. 3 John 9-11: Diotrephes, the prototype of the pseudo-Christian troublemaker.

II. Getting Along – A serious concern for the Lord, for which He gives us grace. Note how these ideas are found in all the NT writers.

- a. The words of Jesus (Gospels): Matthew 20:26; 22:37-40; Mark 9:33-35; John 17:21.
- b. The teaching in James: James 2:1-8, 15.
- c. The teaching of Paul: Romans 12; Romans 14-15:1-7; 1 Corinthians 13; Philippians 2:1-5; Colossians 3:12-15; 1 Thessalonians 3:12, 4:9-10, 5:12-15; Titus 3:2.
- d. The teaching by the writer of Hebrews: Hebrews 10:24-25, 13:1-3.
- e. The teaching of Peter: 1 Peter 1:22; 2:17, 3:8, 4:8-9, 5:5; 2 Peter 1:7

- f. The teaching of the apostle John: 1 John 3:10-18, 4:7-12.
- g. The teaching in Jude: Jude 1:21-23.
- III. Getting Along An increasing necessity as we face a fractured and increasingly unfriendly society.
- IV. Getting Along An inevitable future reality for genuine disciples of Jesus: 1 Thessalonians 4:17-18.

There are no "cubicles" in Heaven!

- V. Practical Steps which reinforce unity and curb dissension:
 - Try to see things from other people's perspectives. The most important thing, of course, is to try to view things from God's perspective. Also, try to understand where others are coming from. You have the Spirit!
 - Unless there is obvious proof, give the benefit of the doubt to the brother or sister in Christ. Of course, we categorically refuse to turn a blind eye to what is clearly wrong.
 - Admit that divining the intentions and motives of the hearts is not your spiritual gift.
 - We can disagree without being mean and ungracious.
 - Make allowance for special mitigating factors: unique situations that might partially explain a person's behavior or words. Are they dealing with tremendous pain? Have they lost a loved one? Are they struggling mentally? Also make allowance for differences in age, in language, in gender, and in maturity in communication.
 - **Family dynamics** can become a minefield when disagreement arise. Walk through them very carefully.
 - Be careful about overprotecting your 'turf' in a ministry.
 - Pray throughout the process of disagreement and attempt to make some move towards reconciliation - even a small one.
 - Allow time to heal after dissension, and know that ultimately, there will be reconciliation, when believers are involved!
