- 1. The sermon uses the parable of the old farmer and his gold-ridden land to illustrate the concept of spiritual wealth. How does this parable resonate with you? How can it change our perspective of the Church and its resources? (Reference: Matthew 13:44)
- 2. How does the concept of spiritual wealth challenge our conventional understanding of wealth and prosperity? What changes can we make in our lives to prioritize spiritual wealth? (Reference: Matthew 6:19-21)
- 3. The sermon talks about our response if Jesus walked into our space. How would you respond? Would you react like the Pharisees or like Mary? What does this tell you about your relationship with Jesus? (Reference: Luke 10:38-42)
- 4. How can we make Jesus our treasure? How does our relationship with God and our faith influence our spiritual wealth? (Reference: Matthew 6:33)
- 5. Discuss the concept of belonging to Jesus. How does this notion of belonging affect your spiritual journey and relationship with the church? (Reference: Galatians 3:26-29)
- 6. The sermon states that our devotion to Jesus determines our spiritual wealth and the future of our church. How does this statement resonate with your understanding of faith and devotion? (Reference: Matthew 22:37-39)
- 7. The sermon ends with a call to receive the treasure of Jesus. How can we actively seek and receive this treasure in our daily lives? What changes might we need to make to fully embrace Jesus as our greatest treasure? (Reference: John 1:12)
- 8. In the sermon, the importance of knowing and appropriating what we have in Jesus by faith is emphasized. How does this understanding affect your personal faith journey? How can you apply this principle in your daily life? (Reference: Hebrews 11:1-3)
- 9. Discuss the statement in the sermon: "Jesus Christ is the treasure of the church." How does this shape your understanding and expectation of the Church? How does it impact your involvement in the Church? (Reference: Ephesians 1:18-23)
- 10. Reflect on the sermon's question: "Do you want Him to be your treasure?" How can we cultivate a desire for Jesus to be our treasure above all else? (Reference: Philippians 3:7-8)
