Three things:

- 1. Peter gives instructions to servants who are believers in their relationship with their masters.
- 2. Peter provides <u>insight</u> to the way that Christians are called to respond to harsh treatment from unbelievers.
- 3. This passage allows us to see some <u>implications</u> for relationships that help us navigate the difficulties we experience with others.

In a world marred by the stain of sin, God gives Christians instruction on how to live in the freedom of Christ, regardless of the situation.

Instruction #1: Submit to those in authority over you, even if they are unjust.

Instruction #2: Live for God in all situations, even if it results in suffering

Insight #1: It's human nature to prioritize your well-being and your reputation, the problem is that human nature is sinful.

Insight #2: God's people serve through suffering, because the one we serve suffered first.

Jesus is the example we follow in our suffering.

- 1. Jesus didn't threaten anyone or publicly defend himself
- 2. Jesus trusted the <u>Father</u> to do what is <u>right</u>
- 3. Jesus <u>suffered</u> to the point of death
- 4. Jesus died to redeem and reconcile sinners to the Father

Application #1: Christian <u>responsibility</u> follows the <u>redeeming</u> work of Christ.

Application #2: Christians have a <u>responsibility</u> to learn how to think <u>Christianly</u> about their circumstances and actions.

Thinking Christianly about difficult relationships and situations:

- 1. You need to know the definition of persecution
- 2. The difference between relationship consequences and persecution.
- 3. Forgiveness does not <u>negate</u> consequences in relationships

Being given the opportunity to rebuild trust is result of <u>forgiveness</u>.

Forgiving and enduring are <u>possible</u> through the <u>power</u> of the Holy Spirit
