Doris Blades Black, 94, beloved Wife, Mother, Grand - mother, Great Grandmother, Aunt, Sister, and Friend passed away peacefully at her daughter's home in San Juan Capistrano, California surrounded by her loving family on January 11, 2024. Doris was preceded in death by her husband Malcolm ("Mal"), son Douglas and brothers John and James Blades. She is survived by her daughter Linda Burton (husband Jack) of San Juan Capistrano and sons Thomas (wife Laurie) of Mesa (Arizona) and Jeffrey (wife Joni) of Santa Ana, sister Nancy Geiler and brother George Blades of Cincinnati (Ohio). Doris had 4 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren.

Doris was born in Orange, New Jersey on March 30, 1929, to parents John and Gertrude Blades. Doris graduated from Summit High School in 1947 and went on to attend the University of Rochester where she excelled academically and graduated with a bachelor's degree in American Studies in 1951. While attending The University of Rochester she met her longtime husband, Mal. They were married in 1951 and celebrated their 72nd wedding anniversary together just before Mal passed in June 2023.

After Mal graduated from the University of Rochester, he enlisted in the Air Force and the couple relocated to Cheyenne, Wyoming. Following the death of their first-born son, Douglas, and Mal's time in the service, they returned to New Jersey where Mal attended Columbia University and upon graduation began to work in the insurance industry.

As Mal furthered his career, the family (which now had 3 young children) moved around a bit – in 1964 from New Jersey to Chagrin Falls (Ohio), then to Mansfield (Ohio) in 1967 and finally in 1970 to Placentia (California). Doris and Mal were active members of the First Presbyterian Church

in Fullerton until their retirement planning took them to Dana Point in 1985 when they became original members of the Laguna Niguel Presbyterian Church.

Doris was a proud stay at home mom, she was very sociable and never afraid to say what was on her mind. She loved to cook, travel, host parties, do puzzles, knit, play Bridge, and volunteer her time to help others. It didn't matter where she lived, she always found a place to play (and teach) her favorite game - Bridge. Doris was a wonderful cook and even produced a recipe book for the family.

Doris was a member of the Placentia Round Table for 52 years, and a member of the Assistance League of Capistrano Valley for nearly 35 years. She also volunteered with Meals on Wheels. She was named Placentia Citizen of the Year in 1975 and was elected in 1978 to serve as the Placentia City Clerk. Following her service to the City of Placentia, a street was named after her – Black Lane.

Doris loved to travel with Mal. During their 72-year marriage they traveled extensively in the United States and to world destinations including England, Ireland, Scotland, France, Germany, Switzerland, Spain, Portugal, Italy, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Russia, Australia, New Zealand, and Mexico. Only Israel and Africa were unvisited on their wish list.

The family thanks you for joining them in this Celebration of Life service. Later this year, we will be taking Doris and Mal to their final resting place, beside their son Douglas, in Fair Mount Cemetery in Chatham, New Jersey.

Thank you for joining us to celebrate Doris's life. The family deeply appreciates your love and prayers.
