## Jesus Changes Everything

*Expectation → Devotion*

**Summary:** In Mark 10, Jesus encounters a young man who asks the question we have all asked, "What must I do to have eternal life?" The young man was sincere in his asking, and he was even sincere in the way he strived to live his life, but his conversation with Jesus quickly revealed a deeper motive within his heart.

### 1. The Rich Young Man Had *Good Intentions*.

#### Mark 10:17

'As Jesus was starting out on his way to Jerusalem, a man came running up to him, knelt down, and asked, "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" '

### 2. The Rich Young Man Had *Good Morals*.

#### Mark 10:18-20

"Why do you call me good?" Jesus asked. "Only God is truly good. But to answer your question, you know the commandments: 'You must not murder. You must not commit adultery. You must not steal. You must not testify falsely. You must not cheat anyone. Honor your father and mother.'" "Teacher," the man replied, "I've obeyed all these commandments since I was young."

### 3. The Rich Young Man Had *Devotion*.

### Mark 10:21-22

'Looking at the man, Jesus felt genuine love for him. "There is still one thing you haven't done," he told him. "Go and sell all your possessions and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me." At this the man's face fell, and he went away sad, for he had many possessions.'

## 4. Jesus Has Something Better.

### Mark 10:23-31

'Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "How hard it is for the rich to enter the Kingdom of God!" This amazed them. But Jesus said again, "Dear children, it is very hard to enter the Kingdom of God. In fact, it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the Kingdom of God!" The disciples were astounded. "Then who in the world can be saved?" they asked. Jesus looked at them intently and said, "Humanly speaking, it is impossible. But not with God. Everything is possible with God." Then Peter began to speak up. "We've given up everything to follow you," he said. "Yes," Jesus replied, "and I assure you that everyone who has given up house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or property, for my sake and for the Good News, will receive now in return a hundred times as many houses, brothers, sisters, mothers, children, and property—along with persecution. And in the world to come that person will have eternal life. But many who are the greatest now will be least important then, and those who seem least important now will be the greatest then." '

### Life Application:

Will your devotion to Jesus today allow you to **loosen your grip** on your expectation for tomorrow **in order to receive what He has promised for you now and for eternity?**

Will you let your devotion to your expectations in this life to **allow you to walk away from what Jesus has for you now and for eternity?**
