God of All Comfort 2 Corinthians 1:3-5

We know God's promises best when we are in direst need of them. It's one thing to quote, as I did a few weeks ago, Psalm 34:18, "*The LORD is near to the brokenhearted and saves the crushed in spirit*." But when my spirit has been crushed, when I am holding the shattered pieces of my hearts; when I can't fix, can't make sense of, when I am face to face with the howling gale of a storm, of suffering, of an affliction in my life – a broken marriage, a wayward child, an unexpected death, an unwelcome disease – it's then that God's promise to be near to the brokenhearted and saving of those crushed in spirit moves from the theoretical and abstract to the concrete and real. We know God's promises best when we are in direst need of them.

As we continue to look at the heart of our Savior in this season of Advent, that Jesus is gentle and lowly of heart, I want to pause today and look at God the Father. As Dane Ortlund points out in the book, *Gentle and Lowly*, we often look at God the Father as being harsh or distant, less inclined to love than Jesus, God the Son. In some way we can tend to look at them as a yin and yang to one another, the Son being the epitome of love in order to balance out the wrath of the Father. What we miss though is that God the Father is just as consumed with love for His people as God the Son is because they are of one mind and one heart in seeing that salvation would come to this broken and sin-sick world. Our text today, 2 Corinthians 1:3-5, makes this interrelationship of merciful love for human beings from God the Father and God the Son clear.

In our day, we often have an allergic reaction to difficulties, challenges, suffering, and affliction in our lives. We come at life, an especially at Christian life as though there should be no problems, no struggles, no afflictions, no hardships. But Jesus is clear in John 16:33, "*In this world you will have trouble. But take heart, I have overcome the world.*" This teaches us that **God doesn't always remove afflictions; however, He does comfort with enduring strength**. This means, that while the affliction may not be removed, God will sustain us, strengthen us, as Jesus will say in chapter 12 of 2 Corinthians, "*My grace is sufficient for you, for my power if made perfect in weakness.*"

I keep using this word affliction, and I do so because it's in our text. But I want to define what I mean. An affliction is something that causes pain or suffering. For example, when I ran my toe into the corner of my bed the other night, I was afflicted. Another example would be a few nights ago we had some fabulous tamales, and my dear wife was afflicted by my gaseous enjoyment a little later that evening. All this to say, **afflictions can be external distresses and internal torments**. They can come from the outside and from the inside. Paul, the author of 2 Corinthians says as much in 1:8, "*For we do not want you to be unaware, brothers, of the affliction we experienced in Asia. For we were so utterly burdened beyond our strength that we despaired of life itself. Indeed, we felt that we had received the sentence of death.*" And again in 4:8, "*We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but ^snot forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be manifested in our bodies." Paul is just like us, no stranger to affliction, to pain and suffering, and recognizes that affliction has multiple sources.*

But this is where we need to pay attention and learn from what Paul is saying in the opening verse of 2 Corinthians, because God the Father's heart towards us, is just as **Jesus's heart towards us as His people, it is to comfort us IN affliction and suffering**. God is, as we see in 2 Corinthians 1:3, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, and because of that we have a key truth to unpack today, and that key truth is this – **God wastes nothing**. God wastes nothing. God is not about to waste a time of suffering or pain or affliction that comes into our lives. Why? Well, this now comes full circle, because we know God's promises best when we are in direst need of them. In other words, our faith in Christ becomes more real, more finely tuned, more concrete and living as we learn to trust and depend on God in all things. Look again at 2 Corinthians 1:9, Paul is talking about the afflictions he has been experiencing and again says, "*Indeed, we felt that we had received the sentence of death. But, that was to make us rely not on ourselves but on God who raises the dead*." Never forget that God will not waste your suffering, God

will not waste your affliction, God will not waste your tears or trials, He will use them to draw us closer to Himself, and to mold us more into the image of our Lord Jesus Christ.

And this alone is to be a comfort to us. Because it helps us to see that **suffering and affliction is not alien to faithful commitment to Christ**. Much of what Paul is talking about in 2 Corinthians has to do with the suffering and affliction he has received as a result of being a minister of the gospel of Christ. And to be sure, Jesus as well teaches us that, "*Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven*. *Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you*." Persecution, affliction, and suffering are simply a part of what it means to be a follower of Jesus, and it is not alien to faithful commitment to Christ.

So what does Paul say to us about the heart of God in bringing comfort to His people? **First, God is in control of our afflictions and suffering**. Verse 3, "*Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ*". This may seem like a simple opening, but Paul is not idly using words here. He speaks of God as Father, reminding us as Jesus does that God in Christ has restored an intimacy of relationship with God previously unknown. He is Father, and the birthright of every Christian is to refer to God as their own Heavenly Father. But notice also that the God who is blessed is also the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. Calling Jesus lord is a bit of a throw away comment in our day. We will quickly say Jesus is our lord and savior, but when pressed as to what that means, many of us will stumble over a meaning or resort simply to vague comments about Jesus taking the wheel. But Jesus being Lord means that He is in control. And that is to be a comfort to us that we do not live in a world in which God is surprised or taken aback by the afflictions and sufferings that come into our lives. It is how we can truly believe Romans 8:28, "… *that for those who love God all tings work together for good*", not because our suffering or affliction or hardship itself is good, but because God is in control and we are not abandoned in our affliction.

A second way God brings us comfort we find at the end of verse 3, God is the Father of mercies, and the God of all comfort; meaning, **the comfort we receive itself comes from God**. Paul says in verse 4 that, "[God] comforts us in all our affliction". This is the reason for Paul's praise and thanksgiving to God. For us, the word "comfort" may imply emotional relief and a sense of well-being, physical ease, satisfaction, and freedom from pain and anxiety. Many in our culture worship the cult and at the altar of comfort in a self-centered search for ease, but it lasts for only a moment and never fully satisfies. The comfort that Paul has in mind has nothing to do with a languorous feeling of contentment. It is not some tranquilizing dose of grace that only dulls pains but a stiffening agent that fortifies one in heart, mind, and soul. Comfort relates to encouragement, help, exhortation. God's comfort strengthens weak knees and sustains sagging spirits so that one faces the troubles of life with unbending resolve and unending assurance. This is comfort that comes from God, a comfort to move us forward, to move us into His arms, to drive us into His presence. All human comfort is vain and short." Not so with God's comfort; it takes many forms but can always match the suffering. God can deliver us "out of affliction" or encourage us "in affliction" so that we can endure it

And this is because, as Christians, we understand that afflictions and suffering serve a dual purpose. **First, to deepen our faith rather than dampen it**. Christianity does not profess to cure suffering but does profess to use it. Again, we know God's promises best when we are in direst need of them. Affliction and suffering are a faith builder, they teach us that reliance on ourselves will be insufficient for life. That we are not nearly as in control as we want to believe, that we need to give ourselves over to the One, give ourselves over to the God who indeed sees the end from the beginning and is the sovereign over all things. Affliction and suffering deepens our faith as we learn to surrender ourselves to Christ and truly His lordship, His control in our lives. You'll notice the Bible never spends time trying to figure out why do bad things happen to good people. Joseph gives us insight into this question when he says to his brothers, "*What you intended for evil, God intended for good.*" Suffering should not lead us to doubt our faith, but to confirm our faith.

And this leads us to the second purpose of affliction and suffering in our lives. **God's comfort of us serves the purpose of preparing us to comfort others**. Look at verse 4, "*Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, who comforts us in al our affliction, so that we may be able to comfort those who are in any affliction, with the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted by God.*" Church, God's comfort is not intended to stop with us. God always gives a surplus, and God intends it to overflow to others. It is given not just to make us feel better but to bolster us for the task of fortifying others to face suffering. God does not comfort us to make us comfortable but to make us comforters. I saw this picture online the other day I thought appropriately conveyed this truth (**show picture**). God wastes nothing. Why? Because our God loves us enough to not leave us in our suffering, but to comfort us, to strengthen us, to develop our faith in Him. And beyond that, to then use our suffering, to use our afflictions, to be able to be a comfort to others.

How do we apply this to our lives? We do so as we both experience and emanate, or share, God's comfort with others.

We experience God's comfort as Christians express care to one another. Suffering becomes an unbearable burden when we feel alone and abandoned. Simply being present with someone in the suffering or affliction, perhaps just acknowledging that it hurts, expresses care for that person. There is tremendous power in praying with, not just for, but with a person who is experiencing some kind of affliction. Perhaps God has comforted you in a particular pain a friend of oved one is now going through. Acknowledge it, be with them, care for them, comfort them as you were comforted by others and by the God.

We also experience God's comfort by caring for others even when we are amid our own suffering. Sometimes the sudden onslaught of affliction may tempt one to retreat into a shell, to shut oneself off from others. The suffering, however, then becomes purposeless. Those who focus only on themselves are the most miserable of people. The persons who turn their pain to helping others can redirect and conquer that pain. Paul knew how to encourage because he knew what it was like to be discouraged. He knew how to comfort because he knew what it was like to feel unbearably crushed. He knew how to console others because he knew what it was like to be at the end of his tether. The difference is that he knows who holds the other end of the tether—God.

And finally, we experience God's comfort by witnessing its power in the lives of others. The testimony of God's grace in one's life is a forceful reminder to others of God's ability and willingness to provide the grace and strength they need.

Jesus had made room in His heart for us, for our suffering and affliction, our pains and hurts, our hardships and adversities. As He has made room in His heart to comfort us, will you make room in your heart to be used by Him to be an instrument that the God of all comfort will use to be a comfort to others?




