



#### Signs of Trust Matthew 16:1-12

How do you develop trust in someone in your life? What's the criteria you use that allows you to say, "Yeah, I want to trust you."? Is your trust in someone something that grows over time? Does someone need to show you they are worthy of trust or demonstrate some things to you before you'll grant them your trust? What's it take? What needs to be seen? What needs to be experienced for you to put your trust in someone? Do you trust quickly or easily? If your honest, do you rarely or ever really give your trust to someone? What's it take for someone to earn or receive your trust? This is a really important question to wrestle with. Being we're in church, we talk a lot about trust: the need to trust God with your life, to trust God with your finances, or with your kids, or with your marriage, or a job, fill in the blank and you've likely heard someone say – you just need to trust God.

And this is really critical when we think about trust Jesus. Because there we rightfully talk about trusting Jesus for our very salvation. So again, I ask, what's it take for you to be willing to trust someone in your life?

It's been a while since we've been in Matthew and I think it's helpful we summarize where we were prior to the Christmas season. As we'll see more over the next two Sundays, chapter 16 is the pivotal chapter in Matthew's gospel. Following increasing hostility from the Jewish religious leaders and political machine, in chapters 12-15, Jesus has increasingly been turning to the disciples to help them understand more clearly His unique identity and mission. He is a prophet, though one without honor among His own people. He is the compassionate healer and supplier of Israel's needs, though they misunderstand His earthly mission. He is the Son of God who can walk on water, can calm stormy seas, and is worthy of worship, even though His disciples falter in fixating on Him. He is the compassionate healer and provider for the Gentiles, even when His disciples wish that were not the case.

Jesus has slowly lead His disciples along to understand the true nature of His person and mission; and the roles they will play as well. Jesus has done this all with an eye towards building and asking for them to trust Him. In the opening of Matthew 16, we are given a story that's really two sides of the same coin. Trust is not easy for Jesus to gain, whether it be from those who have been actively opposing Him like the Jewish religious leaders, or those who seem committed and with Him like the disciples. As Matthew prepares to move us to one of the climatic moments of his gospel, He first reminds us of our need to trust Jesus for who He is not because of what He can do. Let's open our Bible's to Matthew 16.

Have you ever heard the phrase, the enemy of my enemy is my friend? It's an ancient proverb that basically says if you and I dislike the same person – it doesn't really matter if we like each other. We can unite on our mutual disgust of our enemy. Countries do this all the time. For example the United States gets into bed with Iraq in the 1980's not because we think Sadaam Hussein is a great guy, but because He shares in our dislike of Iran and the Ayatollah. The Pharisees and the Sadducees, while prominent in the New Testament time and writings were anything but friends. But their mutual rejection and hatred of Jesus made them friends. Many of us are familiar with the names Pharisees and Sadducees but are not quite sure what makes them different from one another.

The Pharisees were self-righteous legalists who asserted themselves in the face of God. The Pharisees loved Law and laws and setting out numerous restrictions on what was right and wrong before God. They took the Old Testament and went far beyond its teaching to set up an elaborate system of traditions that they held everyone else accountable to. They saw Jesus as a usurper of their own religious authority and control over the people of Israel and sought His destruction as a result. The made a great show of themselves before others and taught that their own righteous acts before God would save them and if only you would live like us you to would know God's favor. The Pharisees were not very fair, you see.

On the other hand you had the Sadducees. The Sadducees were the political elite and aristocracy of Israel. They were in bed with the Romans and used Rome to gain more and more political power regardless of what they had to compromise in terms of faithfulness to God. **The Sadducees were self-indulgent; seeking to please themselves apart from God.** The Sadducees saw only the Torah as God's authoritative word and rejected all the prophets, and anything to do with the afterlife or the resurrection. They lived only for the day and moment, and believed that at death you just went away. Which is what made them quite sad, you see. They saw Jesus as ruining their political advantages and His "kingdom" as

a competition to their own. These two groups couldn't have been more opposite from one another, and were often at one another's throats in the first century world.

When we were last in Matthew's gospel, Jesus and his disciples were in the north eastern region of Israel, in Gentile country. Following the healing of the Canaanite woman and the feeding of the 4000, Jesus and the disciples got back in a boat and sailed for the north western shore of Galilee, back in Jewish territory. The moment they step off the boat, Jesus and the disciples are greeted by these two groups. Look at verse 1. "And the Pharisees and Sadducees came, and to test him they asked him to show them a sign from heaven. The word test is important to see in this context. It's the same word used when Satan leads Jesus out into the wilderness in Matthew 4. The test here is not so they can test Jesus because they are concerned His message might not be orthodox, they are "testing" Jesus so they can expose His inability and show Him a failure. There is no real desire for understanding, their minds area already made up. They are looking for blood. Jesus knows this and exposes their ruse for what it is showing them attentive to the temporal, and blind to the eternal. Verse 2, "He answered them, "When it is evening, you say, 'It will be fair weather, for the sky is red.' And in the morning, 'It will be stormy today, for the sky is red and threatening.' You know how to interpret the appearance of the sky, but you cannot interpret the signs of the times." You have the ability to predict the weather by what you see around, Jesus says; but when the very promise of God's word stands before you in living breathing flesh, when you have been witness to miracles of healing and provision, when you have heard the true exposition of God's word, you are blind to the signs. You know all about your current world, but you are blind to the world to come.

Verse 4, "An evil and adulterous generation seeks for a sign, but no sign will be given to it except the sign of Jonah." So he left them and departed." Jesus is simply pointing out that His opponents are without excuse, they are active in their unbelief and are looking for reasons to reject Jesus and not trust Him. When Jesus was asked for a sign in Matthew 12, I preached on that passage on May 13 if you're interested, Jesus gave the same answer – the sign you will get is the sign of Jonah, which is Jesus' way of alluding to both His death and resurrection. But before we move on, there's an application here I think we need to give some consideration to. Some think that spiritual blindness is sad, but somewhat harmless. I mean, people don't understand or don't want to understand, but in the end it's no big deal. But what this interaction is showing us should be sobering – when spiritual blindness is embraced, as it is actively being done by the Pharisees and Sadducees, it results in more hardness of heart and more darkness. Blindness leads to more blindness, and rejecting Jesus often leads to more rejection. So Jesus is graciously giving us a warning here to consider. With it though in the story, Jesus again leaves for the more fruitful lands of the gentile country to the north.

On the way, **Jesus warns the Disciples about the teaching of Pharisees and Sadducees**. Verse 5, "When the disciples reached the other side, they had forgotten to bring any bread. Jesus said to them, "Watch and beware of the leaven of the Pharisees and Sadducees." And verse 12 makes this explicit, "Then they understood that he did not tell them to beware of the leaven of bread, but of the teaching of the Pharisees and Sadducees." Jesus wants His disciples to be wise and discerning of those who might look religious, might look like they are worthy of trust, but in the end are blind leaders, blind guides, and blindly walking away from God.

But the Disciples at first respond in an almost comical. While the Pharisees and Sadducees are active in their unbelief, the Disciples are passive, being rather self-absorbed. Jesus warns, beware of the leaven of the Pharisees and scribes and the disciples rolling with what Jesus said, verse 7, "And they began discussing it among themselves, saying, "We brought no bread." I envision the scene like this, "Thaddeus, you got some bread right?" "Bread, I thought Phillip was getting it this time?" "Yo, Phil, you got the bread?" "Nope, but maybe Tommy did." To which the rest of the boat says, I doubt it. "Pete, where's the bread?" and Peter says, "You know, I just walked on water guys, do I have to do everything around here?" Jesus warns them about teaching, and what do the disciples do, they start discussing toast. And it's easy sometimes to get frustrated at the disciples or to see them as just bumbling fools. But we would do much better to see ourselves reflected in the disciples rather than be their judges. I mean how many times has the Lord had to be merciful to me when I have been slow to understand what he is doing in my life? How many times has Jesus had to extend grace to you, when you have fallen in that sin... again, and again, and again, and asked forgiveness ... again, and again, and again. What Jesus is about to say to the Disciples, and really to us, might sound harsh, but in the end it's mercy and grace, and love, and patience towards us. It's a reminder again that Jesus is faithful when we are faithless; trustworthy when or hearts are not wanting or able to trust.

Jesus aware of this discussion, in His statements and questions to the disciples provides u with six principles for learning to trust Jesus.

The first principle is this: **Spiritual understanding cannot come apart from faith**. Verse 8 Jesus starts by gently chastising, but chastising none the less, "*O you of little faith*". All spiritual understanding, all spiritual growth, spiritual life itself arises from faith; comes as we put our trust in Jesus Christ alone. For Jesus to say the disciples are of little faith doesn't speak to than quantity of their faith, He's not chastising them for not having enough faith, but rather a shortcoming in the most important aspect of their discipleship – they don't trust their master. And we too can fall in this, and fail in this. We can talk about faith, but when life happens do we actually trust the master?

The second principle is also in verse 8. "Jesus aware of this said, 'O you of little faith, why are you discussing among yourselves the fact that you have no bread?" The disciples are distracted by their immediate circumstance. They hear the word leaven, ignore everything else, and launch into a discussion on bread. In contrast to the Pharisees and Sadducees who are well aware of what Jesus is saying and simply reject, the disciples are a little oblivious as their focus is simply on the world around them. And the principle for us in learning to trust Jesus is this – remove distractions and abandon an earthly focus. We can get very preoccupied with our worlds, sometimes overly preoccupied, to the point that we hear God speaking but we're not paying attention to what He's actually saying. Sometimes this is because we simply are not able to understand and need to find clarification; often it's because we're only listening for what we want and not for what God wants with our lives.

Principle three is very close to what Jesus said to the Pharisees and Sadducees, and serves as a warning for us as well as Jesus' disciples – **lack of trust is a symptom of lingering blindness**. It's a short question, verse 9, "*Do you not perceive*?" Can't you see, Jesus asks. Surely you who have been with me the longest can see who I am and what I am about. And the question should cause in us not shame but humility. None of us will ever arrive in this life. We are all under the process of Jesus continuing to work the blindness out of us. So we shouldn't beat ourselves up so badly when we fail to trust, and we should be patient and persevering with others when they struggle to trust Jesus.

Principle four is this: **learning to trust Jesus we need to remember God's previous work**. Again verse 9, "*Do you not yet perceive? Do you not remember the five loaves for the five thousand, and how many baskets you gathered?*" Rather than a lack of bread when Jesus mentioned leaven, we might have expected the disciples to remember the recent miracles of Jesus in feeding 5000 people with five loaves and two fish, or 4000 people with seven loaves and a few fish. And can't we be like that. A problem comes into our lives, or a challenge, or a difficulty – and we get overwhelmed with the problem that we focus on the immediate and forget that God had been faith in the last challenge, that God was trustworthy when our lives fell apart before, that God was with us when no one else seemingly was… this is perhaps the second most important principle to adhere to and master in learning to trust Jesus as His disciple. God has been at work in the past, which is a guarantee He will be at work in the present, and for our future.

Principle five is closely related to principle four: **we learn to trust Jesus by appropriately depending on Him**. "Do you not remember the five loaves for the five thousand, and how many baskets you gathered? Or the seven loaves for the four thousand, and how many baskets you gathered? How is it that you fail to understand that I did not speak about bread?" Again, not only should there have been memory that Jesus has done mighty things, but at the end of each of the miraculous feeding stories, the disciples picked up ample provisions for themselves to. Part of trusting in Jesus is trusting He will always provide what we need. This is different from providing what we want, sometimes what we want is inappropriate, sinful, or just not necessary. But we have a good Father, we have a loving Lord and Savior and He has promised to always provide what we need, but will we trust and depend on Him for it.

Let me close with the last principle. It's not in the text, but it is the underlying current to any discussion about signs. Principle six: **we need to see who the signs point to**. Jesus does not do miracles to impress us or astound us, they are there to open our eyes to who He is – that He is the Christ, the Son of God, the way and the truth and the life, the only one worth of our trust for the salvation of our souls.



- Lack of trust is a symptom of lingering blindness. Why is it hard to trust God? What blindness' do you find creep up from time to time and you need to overcome?
- How can remembering God's work in the past help us to trust Him now and into the future? Give an example of this principle in your own life.
- Jesus will provide for our needs, so we need to appropriately depend on Him. Again, what makes this difficult or challenging to do? How do you determine what you need from Jesus and what you don't? How are you dependent on Jesus right now in a situation in your life?
- Jesus uses miracles and signs to point to the nature of His person and work. Why are we easily tempted to make more of signs than we should? How do we demand signs from God in our lives as His followers? How do we work to see signs as proof of Jesus' deity?
