



# CONVERSATION GUIDE

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## LEADER PREP

### “Can I Ask That?” – Week 4

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#### The Big Idea

Maybe the point isn't so much knowing God's will, as it is trusting Him enough to move forward.

#### Supplies Needed

Pillow that you can hit people with.

#### HouseGroups Activity

Have everyone sit in a circle as close as they can get. Have each person give their name and make sure each name is clearly said so that all others can hear it. After going through the names once or even twice, have someone start in the middle by asking someone to call the name of someone in the room. The person in the middle proceeds to find the person and try to whomp'em on their legs with a pillow before that person can say both their name and someone else's name in the room.

If they get whomped before they can say their name and someone else's name, they are now "it". Also, if the person whose name is called fails to say both their name and another person's name, they will have to be it. The person who is in the middle takes the place of the person they whomp.

## MAKING IT PERSONAL IN SMALL GROUP

1. Compare the decisions that really stress you out with those that are easier to make. What is the difference between them?
2. What are you currently stressed or anxious about?
3. How do you think you might have responded in Joseph's situation?
4. Why is it often easier to know what our parents, teachers and society want from us but not God?
5. What are your biggest questions about God's will?
6. What do you think it looks like to choose to be part of what God is doing rather than fight against it?
7. Brody said, "what if the point is not so much about what God wants you to do as it is about who He wants you to become?" How might believing that impact your need to know God's will?

## CLOSE TOGETHER AS A HOUSEGROUP

Invite students to share what they have learned about God's will, or ask questions they have. The goal is to take a little time as a large group to allow students to share what they discussed, ask questions that might have gone unasked, and potentially encourage others from different small groups who could have the same thoughts, learnings, or questions.
