Dive Into the Text


- 1. Why is the master described as traveling "after a long time" (v. 19) a significant detail for understanding the master's expectations for the servants?
- 2. The servant who buried the talent claimed he was afraid because the master was a "harsh man" (v. 24). Was the servant's fear justified? Why or why not?
- 3. The master rewarded the first two servants by giving them more, but he chastised the third, took his talent, and threw him into the "outer darkness." What does this punishment suggest is the greatest spiritual risk in the Kingdom of Heaven?
- 4. Failing to invest leads to spiritual depreciation. What does spiritual depreciation look like in the life of an individual or in the life of a church community?

wicked and lazy slave! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter? ²⁷Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have received what was my own with interest. ²⁸So take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents. ²⁹For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. ³⁰As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth."

the "contents" (using one's wisdom and gifts for others).
