Lesson Time

Don't forget! Review the Optional Supplements and determine where you can use them.

Have the students assemble in a circle away from the tables—either on the floor or in their chairs.

Bring your stuffed animal, Bible, Lesson Flip Chart, and any items you prepared for this lesson.

Prayer

This prayer time is designed to help the students begin to understand some simple concepts about prayer and to encourage them to pray.

We start our Bible lesson with prayer. Turn to the Flip Chart Prayer Page. Briefly review the different types of prayer presented there.

Today let's say prayers of supplication and ask God for help with something.

I'll start. Dear God, would you please . . . (insert personal prayer here).

Pass a special stuffed animal—prayer bear—around the circle, giving all the students an opportunity to pray, or choose a volunteer to stand beside you and pray.

Very good! Now let's put our stuffed animal away, and we'll answer our Bible Truth questions.

I love you prayers—Adoration
I'm sorry prayers—Confession
I'm thankful prayers—Thanksgiving
Please prayers—Supplication

Bible Truths

These four questions will be repeated each week to help the students learn foundational truths.

Because God is just, what must he do when we sin? He must punish us.

What word means God may not punish us as we deserve? Mercy.

Can we trust God all the time? Yes, because he is faithful.

What word means God knows all things? Omniscient.

Bible Pass Around

Before Bible Pass Around, place a sticky note in your Bible to mark the first passage to be read. Today, we are going to look into God's Word, the Bible. Hold up Bible. God's Word is true, and we can trust what it says. But where should we look? One of you will help me with that. We're going to play Bible Pass Around. I want everyone to count with me up to the number _____. (You may also choose to recite the books of the Bible, sing one of the lesson songs, or recite the memory verse as you do this activity.) As we say each number (or word), you will carefully pass the Bible to the person beside you. Remember, we don't want to drop it or tear it. Then when we get to the last number (or word), whoever has the Bible will hold on to it until we are ready for it in our lesson. Hand the Bible to the first student. Here we go!

Pre-K Lesson

Bring three marshmallows on skewers. One should be white, another toasted golden brown (may be toasted in an oven/broiler), and the third should be black (overdone).

Optional: Before class, stack up several sticks to look like a campfire, add tissue paper for flames. Lay the skewered marshmallows around the "fire" as if toasting them.

Introduction

Refer to the Exodus to Malachi Timeline. We have learned how the nations of Israel and Judah were punished because they continued to disobey God. Enemies came and took the people away from their homes as captives.

Refer to Lesson 107 Flip Chart. In our last lesson, we learned about four young men who were taken to a different country called Babylon. Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael, and Azariah were chosen to be servants to King Nebuchadnezzar. He wanted them to forget about their home and about God, so he gave them Babylonian names: Belteshazzar, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego.

These young men would not eat the food from the king's table because they wanted to be obedient to God. But after a test, they were allowed to eat only vegetables and drink water. God rewarded their obedience by giving them great knowledge, skill, and wisdom. Daniel was also given the special gift of understanding dreams. All four men became important servants of King Nebuchadnezzar. We'll learn more about them today.

Have marshmallows (and optional campfire) ready.

To start our lesson, I have a question for you. How many of you have ever toasted marshmallows over a campfire? Show of

hands. Show each marshmallow. Discuss which kind students like. Discuss how fire/heat was used for each one (white, golden, and black).

What happens when something is burned by fire? Show black marshmallow. It turns black; turns to ashes; gets ruined.

Fire is powerful, so it must be used safely or it can burn and ruin things and hurt people badly. But God gave us fire as a useful tool. People have used fire for cooking and for lighting in their homes. They've also used it for heat. In our lesson today, King Nebuchadnezzar used fire to scare people into doing something wrong! Let's find out what happened.

The Fiery Furnace

Daniel 3:1

Refer to the Books of the Bible Poster. We'll read from the book of Daniel in the Old Testament. Read Daniel 3:1.

What did King Nebuchadnezzar make? An image of gold.

Show the Lesson Flip Chart. This image, or statue, of gold was about 90 feet tall and 9 feet wide. That's really tall! King Nebuchadnezzar gave a command that whenever special music was played,

everyone must bow down to worship this huge idol. But if anyone did not worship the statue, they would be thrown into a burning fiery furnace.

That sounds terrible! The people were afraid, so they obeyed and worshipped the statue—but not Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego. They wanted to obey God and worship only him.

Now, there were some Babylonians who were jealous of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego and wanted to get rid of them. They went to the king and told him that the three friends would not bow to his statue, which made the king very angry.

The king told them, "If you will not bow to the statue, I will throw you into a furnace with burning fire!"

These brave men answered the king and said, "O king, we know our God can save us. We will not bow to your statue."

The king was so mad, he shouted, "Guards! Make the furnace seven times hotter. Then tie up Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego and throw them in!"

Daniel 3:22-23

Oh no! Listen to what happened. Read verses 22–23.

The fire in the furnace was so hot, it killed the guards who took the men up to the door.

But what happened to Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego? They fell into the burning fiery furnace.

Refer to the Lesson Flip Chart. As King Nebuchadnezzar looked into the furnace, he saw something very surprising: Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego were walking around. They weren't tied up any more—and they weren't being hurt by the fire! Then the king noticed there was another man in there with them.

The Bible doesn't say exactly who this man was. He might have been the Son of God, Jesus. Or he could have been an angel. Whoever it was, God had sent him to protect the three friends from the blazing fire.

Refer to the marshmallows from the Introduction. Now, we know that when something gets too close to a fire, it will get burned like this black marshmallow. And after we've sat near a campfire, our clothes will smell smoky. But when the king called the men to come out of the furnace, they weren't hurt at all! And none of their clothes were burned—they didn't even smell like smoke! This was a miracle that only God could do.

King Nebuchadnezzar was amazed. He could see that God was very powerful. Still, he had a lot to learn about how great God really is.

The Humbling of King Nebuchadnezzar

One night sometime later, Nebuchadnezzar told Daniel about a strange dream that worried him. Daniel explained that the dream meant Nebuchadnezzar would be punished for his sinful pride. His kingdom would be taken away from him, and he would live in the fields like a beast!

Because Nebuchadnezzar thought he was so great, he needed to understand that God was greater—over everything and everyone, including him.

One year later, King Nebuchadnezzar was still full of pride. He looked out over his beautiful city. "I have built this city by my own mighty power," he said. "It shows how great I am."

Suddenly, he heard a voice from heaven saying, "Nebuchadnezzar, your kingdom has been taken away. You will live like an animal until you know that God is the ruler over all things."

Refer to the Lesson Flip Chart. Immediately, Nebuchadnezzar's dream came true. He couldn't think like a man anymore, so he went away and lived like an animal in the fields. His hair and nails grew long, and he probably looked wild and scary!

For seven years, Nebuchadnezzar lived with the animals and ate grass just like them! When he finally lifted his eyes up to God, his mind came back to him, and he praised God. He finally understood that only God is great and in complete control of everything.

Refer to the Lesson Flip Chart. God showed his great power and glory when he saved Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego from the fiery furnace. But Nebuchadnezzar was still very proud of himself and all he had done. Even though it was God who allowed him to build his huge kingdom, Nebuchadnezzar wanted all the credit. It took a horrible punishment, living like an animal, to make him understand that God is in control over everything and everyone.

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The Fiery Furnace

Daniel 3:1 & 6

Refer to the Books of the Bible Poster. We'll read from the book of Daniel in the Old Testament. Read Daniel 3:1.

What did King Nebuchadnezzar make? An image of gold.

Show the Lesson Flip Chart. This image, or statue, of gold was about 90 feet tall and 9 feet wide. That's really tall! It may have been a statue of King Nebuchadnezzar himself. He was a proud king who ruled

over a huge kingdom, so he might have made this statue to show off his greatness and power.

Daniel 4:30

One year later, King Nebuchadnezzar looked out over the wonderful temples, gardens, walls, and other beautiful buildings of his great city. Let's find out what he was thinking from Daniel 4:30. Read the verse.

The king said he had built Babylon by whose mighty power? His own (my) mighty power.

He said he built the city for whose majesty? His (my) majesty.

Nebuchadnezzar was still full of pride. Suddenly, he heard a voice from heaven saying, "Nebuchadnezzar, your kingdom has been taken away. You will live like an animal until you know that God is the ruler over all things."

Refer to the Lesson Flip Chart. Immediately, Nebuchadnezzar's dream came true. He couldn't think like a man anymore, so he went away and lived like an animal in the fields. His hair and nails grew long, and he probably looked wild and scary!
