In Judges 6, the Israelites were once again doing evil in the sight of the Lord by worshipping idols, so God allowed them to be oppressed by the Midianites. They finally cried out to him for help (Judges 6:7). The Lord heard their cry and appeared to Gideon, a man hiding from the Midianites in a winepress (Judges 6:11). Gideon revealed his fear and lack of trust in the Lord when God called him to save Israel, but God promised to be with him (Judges 6:13–16).

When the Midianites returned to Israel with a huge army, many Israelite men rallied to Gideon. But God gave Gideon instructions to reduce the number of men who would participate in the battle. First, any who were afraid were allowed to leave. Next, God directed Gideon to divide the remaining men according to how they drank water from the river. Gideon's fighting force went from 32,000 to 300 (Judges 7:6). God wanted the victory of this battle to point to him alone as the deliverer.

Gideon's men surrounded the Midianite camp armed with trumpets, jars, and torches. At Gideon's signal, they blew the trumpets, smashed the jars, raised their torches, and shouted! God caused

the Midianites to panic and turn on each other before fleeing. God won the battle with his power and Gideon's obedience.

God used Gideon to accomplish a great victory against a fearsome opponent. Gideon was obedient and proved to be strong, due to the Lord's strength in him. Gideon was the fifth and one of the greatest judges of Israel. Because of his faith in the Lord, he is mentioned with the great and faithful saints in Hebrews 11.
