Puppet Review Script

Teacher: Bring the puppets out. Well, guess who is here with me today? Some friends of mine! They are Puppet One and Puppet Two! (Tell the children the names of your puppets.)

Puppet One: Hi, everyone! It's time for you to review your lessons, right?

Teacher or Students: Yes, it is!

Puppet One: Wow! Did Job get mad at God?

Puppet Two: No. He still worshipped and loved God, even when he got terrible sores all over his

body! Itchy and painful!

Teacher: That's right. Job knew if God could give good things, then He could take them away, too.

Puppet One: Who else did you talk about?

Teacher: Well, we learned about a man named Abraham who showed great faith in God.

Puppet Two: I've heard of him! God gave him a promise that he would have lots of descendants.

Puppet One: Descen—what? What are you talking about?

Teacher: Descendants are your family members, like children and grandchildren. God promised Abraham that his son would grow up and have children, and they would have children, and on and on until there were so many he couldn't even count them.

Puppet One: Wow!

Puppet Two: And he was just about to do it, too, when God said, "Stop!" (Shake puppet and shout.)

Puppet One: Really? Phew!

Puppet One: So Abraham didn't offer a sacrifice to God?

Puppet Two: Yes, he did. God made a ram get caught in the bushes, and they gave the ram as an

Puppet One: Wait. Isn't that kinda like what Jesus did for sinners?

Teacher: Very good! That's exactly right. Jesus died so that all who turn from their sins and trust in
