

Substitute Artist

Materials

- ☐ White board, chalkboard, or poster paper
- ☐ Markers or chalk

Instructions

You will start a drawing with a simple shape or line (circle, line, square, triangle, etc.). Students will take turns adding to the drawing with another single shape or line. Each new student is the substitute artist until a picture is completed.

Repeat as desired with different starting shapes. Make sure each student gets a chance to sub as the artist.

Suggested Discussion

We created some pretty funny drawings, didn't we? Having everyone take turns as the artist was interesting because not everyone had the same idea of the final picture. Unlike us, God always knows the final picture. He knew from the beginning that Jesus would come to earth, die for sinners, and rise from the dead to save us.
