Angelic Announcements

God delivers the message of the coming Messiah through his angel Gabriel.

Studying God's Word

Lesson Time

Don't forget! Review the Optional Supplements and determine where you can use them.

Have the students assemble in a circle away from the tables—either on the floor or in their chairs.

Bring your stuffed animal, Bible, Flip Chart, and any items you prepared for this lesson.

Prayer

This prayer time is designed to help the students begin to understand some simple concepts about prayer and to encourage them to pray.

We start our Bible lesson with prayer. Turn to the Flip Chart Prayer Page. Briefly review the different types of prayer presented there.

Today let's say prayers of supplication and ask God for help.

I'll start. Dear God, would you please . . . (insert personal prayer here).

Pass a special stuffed animal—prayer bear—around the circle, giving all the students an opportunity to pray, or choose a volunteer to stand beside you and pray.

Very good! Now let's put our stuffed animal away, and we'll answer our Bible Truth questions.

I love you prayers—Adoration
I'm sorry prayers—Confession
I'm thankful prayers—Thanksgiving
Please prayers—Supplication

Bible Truths

These four questions will be repeated each week to help the students learn foundational truths.

Who do both the Old Testament AND the New Testament tell us about? Jesus, our Savior.

Why was Jesus born as a baby? So that he could die to save sinners.

Did Jesus ever do anything wrong (sin)? No. Jesus is perfect with no sin. Who is Jesus? Jesus is God the Son.

Bible Pass Around

Before Bible Pass Around, place a sticky note in your Bible to mark the first passage to be read.

Today, we are going to look into God's Word, the Bible. Hold up Bible. God's Word is true, and we can trust what it says. But where should we look? One of you will help me with that. We're going to play Bible Pass Around. I want everyone to count with me up to the number ______. (You may also choose to recite the books of the Bible, sing one of the lesson songs, or recite the memory verse as you do this activity.) As we say each number (or word), you will carefully pass the Bible to the person beside you. Remember, we don't want to drop it or tear it. Then when we get to the last number (or word), whoever has the Bible will hold on to it until we are ready for it in our lesson. Hand the Bible to the first student. Here we go!

Pre-K Lesson

Introduction

Refer to the Lesson 123 Theme Poster. In our last lesson, we learned about the four Gospels in the New Testament.

What does the word gospel mean? Good news.

And what is the good news the Gospels tell us about? Jesus came to save sinners.

Each Gospel writer wrote about Jesus, but they told about different things. Matthew wrote to show Jesus as the promised King. Mark showed Jesus as the servant who saves sinners. Luke showed that Jesus came to seek and save the lost, while John wanted people to believe that Jesus is the Son of God and have eternal life in heaven.

Now I have a question for you. What does it mean when someone says, "I have an announcement"? Allow discussion.

Have the printed copy of Announcements ready.

An announcement is when someone tells you some news. It can be good news or bad news or plain news that you just need to know. We're going to play an announcement game. Have students stand up at their seats. As you read the list of Announcements, have them do some kind of action (e.g., clap their hands, pat their head, jump in place, etc.) if they think it's a great announcement. Have them do a different action (e.g., cross their arms in front of them, squat down, or shake head) if they don't think it's a good announcement.

We hear announcements like these all the time. But in today's lesson, we're going to learn about the most important announcement that God ever gave to us—Jesus was about to be born as a baby!

Refer to the Seven C's of History Poster. Which C in the Seven C's of History shows Jesus' birth? Christ.

Jesus Christ came to earth to save us from sin! The Old Testament told about it, and now we're going to see how it happened in the New Testament.

The Announcement of the Messenger

Remember the message Malachi wrote 400 years earlier in the Old Testament? He told the people that there would be a messenger who would come to prepare the way of the Lord. He would help the people get their hearts ready for the Messiah.

Luke 1:5-7

God chose a special way to announce that it was time for the messenger to be born. Let's read about it in Luke 1:5–7. Have the student with the Bible bring it up and open it to the sticky note. Read the verses.

Who was the priest in this verse? Zechariah.

And what was Zechariah's wife's name? Elizabeth.

Zechariah was a priest who came to Jerusalem to serve at the temple, and Elizabeth was his wife. They believed and trusted in the one true God. They loved God and tried to obey his commandments.

How many children did they have? They had no child.

They had no children, and since they were quite old, they most likely would never have any. But they had been praying for a son. Now things were about to change!

As a priest, Zechariah was chosen to go into the Holy Place of the temple and burn incense to God. While he was there, the angel Gabriel suddenly appeared right in front of him! Zechariah was frightened.

Luke 1:13

Wow! That would be kind of scary for an angel to suddenly appear like that. Listen to what happened next. Read the verse.

What did the angel say first? "Do not be afraid."

Zechariah did not need to fear. This was good news that the angel was announcing: God heard Zechariah's prayer for a child.

What did Gabriel say about Zechariah's wife, Elizabeth? She would bear a what? She would bear a son.

And what was Zechariah supposed to name his son? John.

Refer to the Lesson Flip Chart. What wonderful news! Zechariah and Elizabeth would have a baby boy. Gabriel told Zechariah some special things about his son, John. These things matched what the prophet Malachi said about the messenger. John would be filled with the Holy Spirit, and his job would be to help the people get their hearts ready for the Lord.

The Announcement of the Messiah

Remember, we said that if the messenger would be born soon, that meant the Messiah would also be born soon. It makes sense that God would give a very special announcement that the promised child was coming. And he did!

Luke 1:26-27

We can read about it in the Gospel of Luke, chapter one. Read verses 26-27.

Who did God send to announce the news of Jesus' coming? The angel Gabriel.

This is the same angel God sent to Zechariah. Who did Gabriel go to see this time? Mary.

This says that Mary was a virgin. That means she was not married. But she was engaged to a man named Joseph.

Refer to the Flip Chart. Gabriel appeared to Mary and greeted her, but Mary was greatly troubled. She didn't know what to think about an angel visiting.

Luke 1:30-31

Let's read what happened next. Read verse 30.

What did Gabriel say to her? "Do not be afraid. You have found favor with God."

Then the angel announced the really big news! Listen to what he said. Read verse 31.

What did Gabriel say would happen to Mary very soon? She would have a son.

Remember, Mary was a virgin, that means she didn't have a husband. So this baby would be a miracle from God.

And what name was she told to call her very special son? Jesus.

The name Jesus means "God saves." Jesus was the Messiah, who would be born to save people from their sins. God was faithful to do what he had

promised way back in the Old Testament. He told the prophet Malachi to write about the Messiah and about the messenger who would come before him. Now these things were happening, and God sent his angel to make the exciting announcements!

K-1st Lesson

Introduction

Refer to the Lesson 123 Flip Chart. In our last lesson, we learned about the four Gospels in the New Testament.

Zechariah was a priest who came to Jerusalem to serve at the temple, and Elizabeth was his wife. They believed and trusted in the one true God. They loved God and tried to obey his commandments.

How many children did they have? They had no child.

They had no children, and since they were quite old, they most likely would never have any. But they had been praying for a son. Now things were about to change!

Luke 1:11-13

As a priest, Zechariah was chosen to go into the Holy Place of the temple and burn incense to God. Listen to what happened while he was doing his work. Read the verses.

Who appeared to Zechariah? An angel of the Lord.

The Bible says this angel was named Gabriel.

How did Zechariah feel when he saw the angel? He was troubled and afraid. What did Gabriel tell him? "Do not be afraid."

Zechariah did not need to fear. This was good news that the angel was announcing: God heard Zechariah's prayer for a child.

What did the angel tell him about his wife, Elizabeth? She would bear a what? She would bear a son.

And what was Zechariah supposed to name his son? John.

Wow! What wonderful news! Zechariah and Elizabeth would have a baby boy.

Refer to the Lesson Flip Chart. Gabriel told Zechariah some special things about his son, John—things that matched what the prophet Malachi said about the messenger who would come to prepare the people for the Messiah.

This was an exciting announcement! God sent his angel to tell Zechariah that this special messenger would be his son, John. He would be filled with the Holy Spirit, and his job would be to help the people get their hearts ready for the Lord.

The Announcement of the Messiah

Remember, we said that if the messenger would be born soon, that meant the Messiah would also be born soon. But how would the people know who this child was?

Isaiah 7:14

Isaiah answered that question when he wrote about a special sign from God. Listen to this verse, Isaiah 7:14. Read the verse.

What is the sign the Lord promised to give? The virgin shall conceive and bear a what? A son.

A virgin, who is an unmarried lady, would normally need a husband to have a son, so the birth of this son would be a miracle—something only God could do!

Isaiah tells us another name for this son. What is that name? Immanuel.

Immanuel means "God with us." This name means this child would be God, but he would be born as a human baby.

Who is this special child? Does anyone know? Jesus.

Luke 1:26-31

It makes sense that God would give a very special announcement that the promised child was coming. And he did! We can read about it in the Gospel of Luke, chapter one. Read verses 26–27.

Who did God send to announce the news of Jesus' coming? The angel Gabriel.

This is the same angel God sent to Zechariah. Who did Gabriel go to see this time? Mary.

And where was Mary when the angel came? What city? Nazareth.

Remember what Isaiah said about the sign sent from God? The special child had to be born of a virgin—and Mary was a virgin. She wasn't married to Joseph yet. God was making everything happen just as he said it would.

Refer to the Flip Chart. Gabriel came to Mary and greeted her. Listen to these verses. Read verses 28–30.

How did Mary feel when Gabriel greeted her? She was greatly troubled. What did Gabriel say to her? "Do not be afraid. You have found favor with God."

At first Mary wasn't sure what to think. But Gabriel assured Mary that she didn't need to be afraid. Then the angel announced the really big news! Listen to what he said. Read verse 31.

What did Gabriel say would happen to Mary very soon? She would have a son.

And what was she to name this very special son? Jesus.

The name Jesus means "God saves." Jesus was the special child, the Messiah, who would be born to save people from their sins. God was faithful to do what he had promised way back in the Old Testament. He told the prophets like Isaiah and Malachi to write about the Messiah and about the messenger who would come before him. Now these things were happening, and God sent his angel to make the exciting announcements!
