Experiencing God's Glory

God reveals himself in visions of glory to Ezekiel, Isaiah, and John.

Studying God's Word

Lesson Time

Don't forget! Review the Optional Supplements and determine where you can use them.

Have the students assemble in a circle away from the tables—either on the floor or in their chairs.

Bring your stuffed animal, Bible, Flip Chart, and any items you prepared for this lesson.

Prayer

This prayer time is designed to help the students begin to understand some simple concepts about prayer and to encourage them to pray.

We start our Bible lesson with prayer. Turn to the Flip Chart Prayer Page. Briefly review the different types of prayer presented there.

Today let's say prayers of thanksgiving and tell God thank you for something.

I'll start. Dear God, thank you for . . . (insert personal prayer here).

Pass a special stuffed animal—prayer bear—around the circle, giving all the students an opportunity to pray, or choose a volunteer to stand beside you and pray.

Very good! Now let's put our stuffed animal away, and we'll answer our Bible Truth questions.

I love you prayers—Adoration
I'm sorry prayers—Confession
I'm thankful prayers—Thanksgiving
Please prayers—Supplication

Bible Truths

These four questions will be repeated each week to help the students learn foundational truths.

All of God's words in the Bible are what? True! What word means God will always keep his promises? Faithful. When can we trust God? All the time. Is forgiveness of sins a gift from God? Yes. We are saved by grace.

Bible Treasure Hunt

Before Bible Treasure Hunt, place a sticky note in your Bible to mark the first passage to be read.

Each week before class, hide your Bible somewhere in the room. Use different methods each week to keep the students excited about finding the Bible. For example, you might set a timer, play music while the students search, tell students when they are getting warmer and colder, or choose a student to hide the Bible and let you or classmates find it.

We are going to start out today by looking into God's Word, the Bible. God's Word is true, and we can always trust what it says. It's like a great treasure that tells us about who God is and what he has done for us. But where is this treasure? You will have to help me with that. We're going to go on a Bible Treasure Hunt. Somewhere in this room, I've hidden the Bible. When I say "Go," you will need to look for it. Whoever finds the Bible must bring it back to their seat and hold it very carefully until it is time to look in it. When it is time to read, you can bring it to me, and we'll open it to see what we are going to talk about today! Explain the method you chose for today. Ready? Set! Go!

Introduction

Refer to the Exodus to Malachi Timeline. We've been talking about some of the Jews who were taken to live in Babylon, like Daniel and his friends Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego. They stayed obedient to the Lord; and he was faithful to protect them—even while they faced dangers like a fiery furnace and a den of hungry lions!

Have a box/bag with several objects ready.

Put several unfamiliar objects (e.g., kitchen gadgets; gardening, sewing, or mechanic's tools) into a box or bag for students to describe. We're going to start today's lesson with a game. I have several objects in this box/bag that most of you have not seen before. I'm going to ask someone to choose an object and describe it to us. That means he will tell us things such as its shape, its color, or if it has moving parts. And we'll all try to help him figure out what it is. Choose a volunteer to pick one object out of the box/bag and show it to the class. Help him describe the object by asking questions about it. Give hints to the class to help them figure out what the object is used for.

That was fun learning about these new things. But sometimes it was hard to describe some of the objects, wasn't it? If you don't know what something is, it can be hard to tell someone about it.

In our lesson today, we're going to learn about three men who saw new things they had never seen before. God gave these three men visions, which are kind of like dreams, of heaven and his glory. These men did their best to describe the wonderful things they saw. Let's read about what it was like when they saw God's awesome glory.

Ezekiel's Vision

Refer to the Books of the Bible Poster. We're going to start with a prophet named Ezekiel. One day God opened up the heavens so Ezekiel could see visions of God's glory.

There were so many things Ezekiel had never seen before, so it was hard for him to describe. The Bible says he saw bright colors, fire and lightning, and even creatures that looked like men, lions, oxen, and eagles—all at the same time!

Then Ezekiel saw something that looked like a throne made from a beautiful blue jewel. And above this throne, he saw what looked like a man who was shining with fire and brightness.

Ezekiel 1:28

Ezekiel tried to describe what he saw another way. Listen as I read Ezekiel 1:28. Have the student holding the Bible bring it up and open it to the sticky note. Read the verse.

What do we call a bow in the clouds on a rainy day? A rainbow.

Yes. What he saw looked something like a rainbow.

When Ezekiel saw the beautiful glory of the Lord, what did he do? He fell on his face.

Refer to the Lesson Flip Chart. All Ezekiel could do was to fall down in worship, praise, and fear. He saw so many amazing things. It was hard for Ezekiel to tell about them, but he could see that God is holy and awesome!

Isaiah's Vision

Let's read about the vision given to the prophet Isaiah.

Isaiah 6:1

Refer to the Books of the Bible Poster. We'll read from Isaiah 6. Listen to the first verse and tell me what Isaiah saw. Read Isaiah 6:1.

Who did Isaiah see sitting on the throne? The Lord. What was filling the temple? The train of his what? The train of his robe.

Show Illustration. The train is the long part of a robe that trails behind the person. Maybe you've seen a bride wearing a wedding dress that had a long, flowing train. Isaiah saw the long, wonderful train of the Lord's robe that filled up the temple!

When Isaiah looked up, he saw creatures called seraphim, who flew with wings and worshipped God. They cried out, "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts!" And when they said this, the doors shook, and the temple filled with smoke.

Wow! What do you think Isaiah did when he heard and saw all this? Allow guesses.

Refer to the Flip Chart. Isaiah said, "Woe is me!" That's like saying you're very sorry for something. The seraphim reminded Isaiah that God is holy, without any sin, and that he is our all-powerful Creator. Isaiah was sorrowful because he understood how sinful he was when he saw how holy God is.

John's Vision

Refer to the Books of the Bible Poster. Let's look at one more vision in the book of Revelation—the last book of the Bible. This vision was shown to John, who was a close friend and disciple of Jesus.

Revelation 1:13-16

After Jesus died and rose again, he went back to heaven. Then many years later, he let John see him in this vision. Listen as I read how John described Jesus in Revelation 1. Read verses 13–16.

John saw Jesus wearing a long robe with a golden sash around his chest. (Verse 13)

What was Jesus' hair like? (Verse 14) White like wool or snow. What were his eyes like? A flame of fire.

His feet were like bright, shining metal, called bronze. And his voice sounded very loud and powerful, like the sound of a huge waterfall or a rushing river. (Verse 15)

And what did his face look like? (Verse 16) Like the sun shining in full strength.

The sun is super bright, isn't it? So was Jesus' face.

Refer to the Flip Chart. John was so afraid at this awesome sight of Jesus that he fell down at Jesus' feet. Jesus told John that he didn't need to fear. He explained that he has always been and always will be God and that he is the only way we can be free from the punishment of hell. By trusting in Jesus and turning away from our sin, we can have eternal life in heaven with him.

Like Ezekiel and Isaiah, John worshipped the Lord when he saw God's glory in heaven. These three men all loved and obeyed God, but they were humbled when they saw how great God is.

To be humble means that you do not think you are better than others. These visions we read about remind us that God is better and greater than

anyone. God allowed Ezekiel, Isaiah, and John to see these things and to write about them in the Bible so that we can understand more about God's awesome power and glory. And just like these three men did, we can humbly worship God, too.

K-1st Lesson

Introduction

Refer to the Exodus to Malachi Timeline. Remember how the people in the southern kingdom of Judah were captured and taken from their homes to Babylon? God gave the people hope, though, when the prophet Jeremiah said God would bring them back home after 70 years.

We've been talking about some of the Jews living in Babylon during those 70 years. We learned about Daniel and his friends Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, who were chosen to serve the Babylonian king. Although they were living in a foreign country with many false gods, Daniel and his friends stayed obedient to the Lord; and he was faithful to protect them—even while they faced dangers like a fiery furnace and a den of hungry lions!

Have a box/bag with several objects ready.

Put several unfamiliar objects (e.g., kitchen gadgets; gardening, sewing, or mechanic's tools) into a box or bag for students to describe. We're going to start today's lesson with a game. I have several objects in this box/bag that most of you may not have seen before. I'm going to ask someone to choose an object and describe it to us. That means he will tell us things such as its shape, its color, if it has moving parts, or if it's something he's seen someone use before. And we'll all try to help him figure out what it is. Choose a volunteer to pick one object out of the box/bag and show it to the class. Help him describe the object by asking questions about it. That was fun learning about these new things. But sometimes it was hard to describe some of the objects, wasn't it? If you don't know what something is or haven't seen it before, it can be hard to tell someone about it.

In our lesson today, we're going to learn about three men who saw new things they had never seen before. God gave these three men visions, which are kind of like dreams, of heaven and his glory. These men did their best to describe the wonderful things they saw. Let's read about what it was like when they saw God's awesome glory.

Ezekiel's Vision

Refer to the Books of the Bible Poster. We're going to start with a prophet named Ezekiel. Have the student with the Bible bring it up and open it to the sticky note.

Ezekiel 1:1

Listen to Ezekiel 1:1 so you can tell me what happened. Read the verse.

What did Ezekiel see opening up? The heavens. And he saw visions of whom? Visions of God.

Ezekiel 1:4

Let's read more in Ezekiel 1:4. Read the verse.

What things did Ezekiel see in his vision? A great cloud with brightness around it, flashing fire, and gleaming metal.

Wow! Remember, Ezekiel had never seen things like these before, so they were hard for him to describe. There were bright colors, fire and lightning, and even creatures that looked like men, lions, oxen, and eagles—all at the same time!

Then Ezekiel saw something that looked like a throne made from sapphire, a beautiful blue jewel. And above this throne, Ezekiel saw what looked like a man who was shining with fire and brightness.

Ezekiel 1:28

Ezekiel was looking at God's glory, and he tried again to describe it. Listen as I read verse 28. Read the verse.

What did it look like? What do we call a bow in the clouds on a rainy day? A rainbow.

Yes. Rainbows are beautiful, aren't they?

When Ezekiel saw the beautiful glory of the Lord, what did he do? He fell on his face.

Refer to the Lesson Flip Chart. What an amazing vision! It was hard for Ezekiel to describe it all. God is holy, awesome, and powerful! All Ezekiel could do was to fall on his face in worship, praise, and fear.

Isaiah's Vision

There are only two other places in the Bible where God let men see things like this. Let's look at the vision given to the prophet Isaiah.

Isaiah 6:1 & 5

Refer to the Books of the Bible Poster. We'll read from Isaiah 6. Listen to the first verse and tell me what Isaiah saw. Read Isaiah 6:1.

Who did Isaiah see sitting on the throne? The Lord. What was filling the temple? The train of his what? The train of his robe.

Show Illustration. The train is the long part of a robe that trails behind the person. Maybe you've seen a bride wearing a wedding dress that had a long, flowing train. Isaiah saw the long, magnificent train of the Lord's robe that filled up the temple!

When Isaiah looked up, he saw winged creatures called seraphim. Isaiah describes them as heavenly beings that flew around worshipping God in heaven. They cried out, "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts!" And when they said this, the doors shook, and the temple filled with smoke. Wow! This would have been an awesome sight! What do you think Isaiah did when he heard and saw all this? Allow guesses.

Listen to verse 5 to find out what he did. Read verse 5.

What were Isaiah's first three words? "Woe is me."

Refer to the Flip Chart. "Woe is me" is a way of saying you're very sorry for something. The seraphim reminded Isaiah that God is holy and perfect, without any sin, and that he is our all-powerful Creator. Isaiah was sorrowful because he understood how sinful he was when he saw how holy God is.

John's Vision

Refer to the Books of the Bible Poster. Let's look at one more spectacular vision in the book of Revelation—the very last book of the Bible. This vision was shown to a man named John, who was a close friend and disciple of Jesus.

Revelation 1:13-16

After Jesus died and rose again, he went back to heaven. Then many years later, he let John see him in this vision. Listen as I read how John described what he saw in Revelation 1. Read verses 13–16.

John saw Jesus standing by some golden lampstands. What was Jesus wearing? (Verse 13) A long robe with a golden sash around his chest. What did John say his hair was like? (Verse 14) White like wool or snow. What were his eyes like? Like a flame of fire.

His feet were like bright, shining metal, called bronze. (Verse 15)

What did his voice sound like, the roar of what? Like the roar of many waters.

That would be like the sound of a huge waterfall or a rushing river or the ocean waves crashing on the seashore; it's very loud and powerful.

And what did his face look like? (Verse 16) Like the sun shining in full strength.

The sun is super bright, isn't it? So was Jesus' face.

Refer to the Flip Chart. John was so afraid at this awesome sight of Jesus that he fell down at Jesus' feet. Jesus told John that he didn't need to fear.

He explained that he has always been and always will be God and that he is the only way we can be free from the punishment of hell. By trusting in Jesus and turning away from our sin, we can have eternal life in heaven with God.

Like Ezekiel and Isaiah, John fell down in humble worship and fear when he saw God's glory in heaven. These three men all loved and obeyed the Lord, but they were humbled when they saw how great God is.

What does humble mean? Allow answers.

To be humble means that you are not proud or boastful and that you don't think you are better than anyone else. These visions we read about remind us that God is better and greater than anyone. God allowed Ezekiel, Isaiah, and John to see these things and to write about them in the Bible so that we can read and understand more about God's awesome power and glory. And just like these three men did, we can humbly worship God, too.
