

HomeWord For Parents

Despite God's amazing defeat of the Egyptians at the Red Sea, the Israelites soon began to grumble about food and water. When they were hungry or thirsty, they complained to Moses.

Moses responded by crying out to God. God graciously provided quail one evening. Then in the morning, he provided a fine, flake-like food with the dew. Moses told them that this food was bread from the Lord (Exodus 16:11–15). The people named the white wafers manna, meaning "What is it?" (Exodus 16:31). The Israelites ate manna for 40 years until they came to the border of the land of Canaan (Exodus 16:35). God also miraculously provided water in the wilderness by turning bitter water into sweet water and by causing water to flow from a rock.

The Israelites' next test was a battle against the Amalekites. Moses sent Joshua and their fighting men to meet this attack. Then he went to the top of a hill with Aaron, Hur, and his staff. Whenever Moses' hands were raised, God gave the Israelites victory. But when his hands lowered, the Amalekites prevailed. Aaron and Hur helped by holding up Moses' arms until the end of the day, and the Israelites were victorious (Exodus 17:8–13).

Each test in the wilderness, whether hunger, thirst, or battle, was meant to teach the Israelites to rely on God. Instead of grumbling, the Israelites should have responded as Moses did, by crying out to the Lord for help.
