

OutWord For Family Discussion

What if your friend always talks about being happen to him? What could you say?

HomeWord For Parents

The book of Esther is an intriguing account. Esther was a Jew. Her family had been deported from Judah during the Babylonian takeover. And God worked his will in such a way that this beautiful, young lewish woman would become the queen of the pagan nation of Persia. She gained favor in the eyes of the king's servant and the king himself (Esther 2:15–18).

When the wicked Haman came to power, trouble began. Mordecai refused to bow to him as commanded (Esther 3:1-2). Mordecai's refusal fueled hatred in Haman not only for Mordecai but for all the lews. Haman used his power to present a decree that commanded all the Jews in Persia to be killed. There was great mourning among the Jews.

Mordecai encouraged Esther to approach the king and attempt to save the Jews. Even as gueen, Esther was afraid because an audience with the king had to be by invitation only. Anything else could result in death! She agreed to go when Mordecai reminded her that perhaps she had come to this place at this time to save the Jewish people (Esther 4:14).

Esther agreed to help her people. She courageously appeared before the king. She found favor in his sight, and the king extended his golden scepter and offered to fulfill her request. At Esther's requested banquet, she petitioned the king to spare her and her people from Haman's plot to

> destroy them. And through a twist of events that only God could have ordained, Haman was hanged on the gallows he had built for Mordecai while Mordecai was elevated to Haman's position. Esther and Mordecai were allowed to write their own edict to protect the Jews (Esther 8:5, 8:8). Nowhere in this biblical account is God mentioned.
