Lesson 11

Refer to the Seven C's of History Poster as you review.

Slide #4

Show Lesson 11 Theme Poster. The Bible is the history book of the universe—God's history! There are Seven C's of History to help us remember what the history in the Bible includes.

What is the first C? Creation.

Yes! God created everything in the universe in six 24-hour days. And it was NOT millions of years ago—but just about 6,000 years ago.

How about the second C? What is that one? Corruption.

Right. Sin entered the world when Adam and Eve disobeyed God in the garden of Eden. God's perfect, very good creation was corrupted by sin.

What is the next C? Catastrophe.

God judged man's sin with a worldwide flood. Noah and his family were the only people who lived through it—only eight people survived.

Who can tell me the fourth C? Confusion.

Men sinned again! And God punished them by confusing their one language into many languages.

How about the fifth C? What is that one? Christ.

All people are sinners, and they continue to sin. God must judge sin. But because God is loving and merciful, he sent his Son, Jesus Christ, to make a way for sinners to be saved.

And he did that by dying for sinners, which leads us to the next C. What is that one? Where did Jesus die? On the cross.

Jesus became the perfect sacrifice when he died on the cross and took the punishment that sinners deserve.

And the last C. What is that called? Consummation.

This will happen at the end of history. Jesus will return for all believers. God will create a new heaven and new earth where they will live forever with him.

Lesson 12

Show Lesson 12 Theme Poster. The Bible tells us that God created the universe in six days. On day one, God created the heavens, earth, and light. On day two, God created the expanse, including the sky and outer space, and the atmosphere, or the air we breathe. On day three, God created dry land and all the plants. On day four, God created the sun, moon, stars, and planets. Then on day five, God created all the sea creatures and flying creatures. And on day six, God created land animals and his most precious creation—man.

Refer to the Attributes of God Poster. We can only imagine God's amazing power. Who remembers the word that means God is all-powerful? See if you can find it on the Attributes of God Poster. Omnipotent.

Right! We can see God's omnipotence as we read about how he made everything just by speaking.

Lesson 13

Slide #6

Show Lesson 13 Theme Poster. Okay, let's go on to Lesson 13. God created the universe by the power of his word—as he spoke everything came to be.

How many days did he do it in? Six days.

Yes! He did it in just six 24-hour days. We know they were normal 24-hour days because of the way the Hebrew word yom is used in Genesis. The Bible says "evening and morning" and the number of each day—first, second, third, fourth, fifth, and sixth. In the Bible, when the word yom is used this way, it means a regular day with 24 hours!

God's Word is true. We can trust it! So when God says he created plants and animals to reproduce according to their kinds, we can believe it. This just makes sense. An apple seed will grow an apple tree. A maple seed will grow a maple tree. When you plant strawberry seeds, you get strawberries. One kind of animal or one kind of plant will never turn into something different than what God designed it to be.

Lesson 14

Show Lesson 14 Theme Poster. Then we saw how God created the creatures that fill the sky and waters on day five and land animals on day six. We were reminded that even the extinct animals, such as dinosaurs, were made at the same time—about 6,000 years ago—not millions of years ago.

On day six, God also created the first man and woman. What were their names? Adam and Eve.

God created people to be very different from the animals. People can think, write, talk, learn, love each other, forgive someone, ask forgiveness, know right from wrong, and most importantly, we can have a relationship with God through Jesus Christ.

We are not like the animals. We did not evolve from any animal. We are a unique, special creation—made in God’s image.

Lesson 15

Show Lesson 15 Theme Poster. The Bible is God’s history book of the universe, and we know that everything God says is true. The Bible tells us, with lots of details, how God created man and then woman.

God created Adam from the dust of the earth and then created Eve from Adam’s rib. They were both created on day six of creation week.

When God created Eve, the first woman, and then brought her to Adam, that was the first wedding. God said a man would leave his father and mother and join with his wife when they got married. God’s perfect plan for marriage has always been one man and one woman together for life!

How many years ago did this all happen? About 6,000 years ago.

Some evolutionists want us to believe that people started millions of years ago as another creature and kept changing until they became humans.

Did we evolve from ape-like creatures? No!

No! Absolutely not! We are not animals. We are human beings made uniquely by God in his image.

Lesson 16

Show Lesson 16 Theme Poster. In Lesson 16, we read about two dinosaur-like creatures described in the book of Job. The Behemoth was a big, strong land animal that sure sounds a lot like a great Brachiosaurus dinosaur!

And the Leviathan was a sea creature that breathed fire and smoke from his mouth and nose. What does that sound like? A dragon.

Right! This is the description of a dragon! The fact that these animals really did exist explains why there are so many dragon legends heard around the world. People really saw them. All these legends talk about animals much like the Leviathan in the book of Job in the Bible.

These animals—the dinosaurs and the dragons—really lived! They were created on days five and six of creation week about 6,000 years ago—NOT millions of years ago.

Lesson 17

Slide #10

Show Lesson 17 Theme Poster. In Lesson 17, we learned what the Bible says about how old the earth really is. The genealogies in Genesis are very important because they tell us how old the earth is.

Remember the list of people and their ages in Genesis 5 and 11? We used those to add up the number of birthdays the earth has had.

How many birthdays has the earth had? About 6,000!

Yes! According to the Bible, the earth is only about 6,000 years old.

Some scientists test rocks and fossils to try and find out how old the earth is. One test they use is called radiometric dating. But these tests aren't very good or accurate. Many times the answers they get do not match up with one another, and they come up with dates that say the earth must be millions or billions of years old. But that's not what the Bible says. We should always trust what God's Word says. God was there!

Lesson 18

Slide #11

Show Lesson 18 Theme Poster. God created Adam and Eve and then gave them dominion—the responsibility or rule—over the earth. They were to take care of the garden they were in and all the animals God put there.

Taking care of something for someone is called stewardship. We all have been given the responsibility to be good stewards and take care of God's creation. We can plant gardens, pick up trash, recycle, care for animals, and hunt or fish responsibly.

Some people, however, love the earth so much that they have forgotten the one who created it. In other words, they worship the creation MORE than they worship the Creator, God.

We all need to work at taking care of the earth according to God's Word. However, we must never love the earth so much that we forget God, Jesus, or the gospel.

Many people worry about global warming and the temperatures on the earth. They fear we are destroying the planet by how we live. But God has promised to keep the earth going as he wants it for as long as he wants it. God is in control.

Lesson 19

Show Lesson 19 Theme Poster. In Lesson 19, we moved on to our second C in the Seven C's of History—Corruption! Sin entered the world when Adam and Eve disobeyed God.

What did they do to disobey? They ate the fruit from the one tree God said not to eat from.

This was the very first sin! And this first sin led to the first death in the universe. God killed an animal in the garden of Eden to provide clothes for Adam and Eve.

This first death was a picture of something to come many years later. Someone else would have to die and lose his blood for sinners. Who was that? Jesus.

Yes. The one to come was Jesus Christ, God's only Son—the perfect sacrifice. He died once for all sinners. Then he was raised from the dead. And now Jesus offers complete forgiveness to all who repent, turn away from their sin, believe in him, and trust him in faith.

Wow! We've learned a lot, haven't we? Let's work on an activity now that will help us remember all these things from God's Word.
