# STUDY QUESTIONS

## A DEEPER DIVE:

**As a group, read James 2:1-13.**

- Have a few people read James 2:1 from different translations of the Bible (for instance, ESV, NASB, NLT, NIV).
  - Take some time and draft a workable group definition for “favoritism” or “partiality.”
  - Describe a time that you may have felt favored or received special treatment. How did that feel? How might it make others feel?
  - Describe a time when you felt less favored. Perhaps a person or persons were treated better than you. How did that make you feel? How might that make others feel?
  - Why would James connect favoritism and our mutual faith in Jesus?
  - If someone asked you to share the Gospel, the “Good News” of Jesus, in less than two minutes, what would you say?
  - Have you or someone you know ever experienced something like what James is describing in James 2 while participating in a church?
  - What are some ways we could possibly guard against “favoritism” in our church?
  - As a group, come up with a workable definition of “grace”?

Commit to first, **humbly receiving God’s grace for you** and, second, **extending that grace to others you encounter**. Yes, even when it’s hard!
