# A. THE PARENT AS A DISCIPLINARIAN

"And fathers, do not provoke your children to anger; but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord." — Ephesians 6:4

Training Includes — Rules, guidelines, restrictions, rewards, correction, and structure

## A. THE PARENT AS A DISCIPLINARIAN

What makes discipline ineffective or effective?

- Unbiblical vs Biblical

a. Depends excessively on controlling the child.

Out of balance discipline may:

- 1. Provoke a child to rebel.
- 2. Prevent the development of inner convictions.

- b. Disciplines in uncontrolled anger (Prov. 14:17,16:32)
- Being explosive means you'll be inconsistent.
- Angry over a separate issue and taking it out on them.
- Unresolved anger released on your children.
- Forgive and do not be bitter.

# 25 WAYS PARENTS PROVOKE

- 1. Lack of marital harmony
- 2. Establishing and maintaining a child centered home
- 3. Modeling sinful anger
- 4. Habitually disciplining while angry
- 5. Scolding angry tone/harsh tone
- 6. Being inconsistent with discipline
- 7. Having double standards
- 8. Being legalistic
- 9. Not admitting when wrong / Not asking for forgiveness
- 10. Constantly finding fault
- 11. Parents reversing God given roles
- 12. Not listening to your child's opinion or side of the story
- 13. Comparing them to others

- 14. Not making time to 'just talk'
- 15. Not Praising or encouraging your child
- 16. Failing to keep your promises
- 17. Chastening in front of others
- 18. Not allowing enough freedom
- 19. Allowing too much freedom

- 21. Abusing them physically
- 22. Ridiculing or name calling
- 23. Unrealistic expectations
- 24. Practicing favoritism
- 25. Training with methods inconsistent with God's word

- c. Discipline because the child is an inconvenience.
  - Selfish motivation
  - Only when bothered

- d. Disciplines without a balance of encouragement.
- "...admonish the unruly, <u>encourage</u> the fainthearted, <u>help</u> the weak, <u>be patient</u> with everyone." 1

Thessalonians 5:14

"Spare the rod and spoil the child — that is true. But beside the rod keep an apple to give him when he has done well." — Martin Luther

- e. Thinks discipline will hinder creativity and potential.
- a child left to himself will bring his mother shame (Proverbs 29:15)
- Great athletes do not become great without discipline (2 Timothy 2:5)

## f. Thinks discipline will warp the child.

- The world's thought: it makes the child insecure.
- Without discipline, foolishness is left to reign in the child's heart (Proverbs 22:15).
- God's truth: it's your child's greatest security.

g. Neglects timely correction.

"Because the sentence against an evil deed is not executed quickly, therefore the hearts of the sons of men among them are given fully to do evil." — Ecclesiastes 8:11

## Don't delay discipline by:

- Waiting until the child's habits have become ingrained
- Allowing a particular incident to continue without addressing it (1 Sam 3:13)

#### h. Withholds the use of the rod.

"Do not hold back discipline from the child, although you beat him with the rod, he will not die. You shall beat him with the rod, and deliver his soul from Sheol." (Proverbs 23:13-14)

"He who spares his rod hates his son, but he who loves him disciplines him diligently." - Proverbs 13:24

"The rod and reproof give wisdom, but a child who gets his own way brings shame to his mother." — Proverbs 29:15

## Discipline is unbiblical when:

- 1. It depends excessively on correction without balance of instruction.
- 2. It's done in anger or selfish motives.
- 3. It's done without a balance of praise.
- 4. It's delayed.
- 5. It completely ignores the rod.

- a. It is loving.
- i. Sets Beneficial Limits:
  - Provide a good setting for learning
  - Establish order in the home (1 Tim 3:4, Prov 31:10-31)
  - Protect the child from things he cannot handle
  - Prepare a child for the limits of life situations
  - Reveal the need for teaching

- a. It is loving.
- i. Beneficial Limits:
  - Expose his inability to keep the standard and his need for a Savior

No Standard = No Sin = No Need for a Savior Low Standard = Pharisaism = No Need for a Savior
