Apostolic Work of Ministry: Zion's Ministry Legacy



Session Goals

Acts 13:2-4

Among the prophets and teachers of the church at Antioch of Syria were Barnabas, Simeon (called "the black man"), Lucius (from Cyrene), Manaen (the childhood companion of King Herod Antipas), and Saul. **2** One day as these men were worshiping the Lord and fasting, the Holy Spirit said, "Appoint Barnabas and Saul for the special work to which I have called them." **3** So after more fasting and prayer, the men laid their hands on them and sent them on their way. (Acts 13: 2-4)

Prayer Focus:

"Lord, set us apart, speak clearly, and send us with Your Spirit's power."

Pillar 1: Apostolic Calling and Commission (John

20:21; Matthew 28:18-20; Acts 1:8)

- Apostolic ministry begins with being sent, not just starting something.
- •Church planting is obedience to the Great Commission: go, make disciples, baptize, teach.
- The Holy Spirit calls, confirms, and commissions church planters.
- •Without clarity of calling, the challenges of planting will cause collapse.

Pillar 2: APOSTOLIC PIONEERING & PLANTING

(Romans 15:20; Acts 16 & 19; 1 Corinthians 3:10; Acts 14·21–23)

- •Apostolic ministry breaks new ground. It's a **pioneering work**, not a comfortable one.
- •Paul targeted strategic cities because city impact leads to regional impact.
- •Church planters:
- •Evangelize (preach the gospel)
- Disciple (form believers)
- Strengthen (build community)
- Organize (establish structure)
- Appoint (develop leaders)

Pillar 3: APOSTOLIC EQUIPPING & ESTABLISHING

(Ephesians 4:11–12; Titus 1:5; Jude 3; Acts 20:28–

32)

- •Apostolic ministry raises disciples and leaders, not spectators.
- •A church planter equips, trains, and shapes the culture.
- •Apostolic work also guards doctrine, ensuring the church stays biblically sound.
- •Every team member must embrace:
- Spiritual maturity
- Servant leadership
- Unity
- Submission to biblical structure

Pillar 4: APOSTOLIC MULTIPLICATION & REGIONAL IMPACT (2 Tim. 2:2; Acts 19:10; 1 Cor. 4:15-17)

- •Apostolic ministry looks beyond one launch day—it sees generational influence.
- •The goal is multiplying disciples, leaders, small groups, and eventually churches.
- •Paul raised sons and daughters, created teams, and built movements.
- •Apostolic ministry embraces **sacrifice**, **suffering**, **and perseverance**, knowing the la produces fruit.
