Reading: John 7:37-39

Devotional:

In the wedding at Cana, we see how Jesus turns emptiness into abundance. When the wine ran out, Jesus didn't just provide a little - He filled six large jars to the brim with the finest wine. This miracle points to a greater truth about God's nature and His desire for our lives.

Jesus promises that those who come to Him will never thirst again. He offers living water that becomes a spring welling up to eternal life. When we feel empty, depleted, or running on our last reserves, Jesus invites us to come to Him for replenishment.

Consider areas in your life where you feel 'empty' - perhaps you're lacking joy, purpose, or strength. Bring these to Jesus today. Ask Him to fill you with His Spirit, to the point of overflowing. Trust that He can take your emptiness and turn it into abundance, just as He did with the water jars at Cana.

Day 3: Obedience Precedes Miracles

Reading: Luke 5:1-11

Devotional:

Mary's instruction to the servants at the wedding - "Do whatever He tells you" - is a powerful reminder of the role obedience plays in experiencing God's miracles. The servants' willingness

to follow Jesus' seemingly odd command to fill the jars with water opened the door for an incredible miracle.

Often, God's instructions may not make immediate sense to us. He might ask us to forgive someone who's hurt us deeply, to give when we feel we don't have enough, or to step out in faith when we can't see the whole path. Yet, it's in these moments of obedience that we position ourselves to witness God's power at work.

Reflect on an area where God might be calling you to obey, even if it doesn't make complete sense right now. What's holding you back? Remember, your obedience, like the servants filling the jars with water, could be the first step towards a miracle. Take that step of faith today, trusting in God's wisdom and power.

Day 4: Transformation Through Christ

Reading: 2 Corinthians 5:17-21

Devotional:

The transformation of water into wine at Cana is a powerful metaphor for the transformative work Christ does in our lives. Just as Jesus turned ordinary water into extraordinary wine, He takes our ordinary, flawed lives and makes them new and purposeful.

Paul reminds us that in Christ, we are new creations. The old has gone, the new has come. This isn't just a one-time event at salvation, but an ongoing process as we yield ourselves to God's work in our lives.

Consider areas in your life where you long to see transformation. It might be a character flaw, a harmful habit, or a painful memory. Bring these to Christ today. Ask Him to do His transformative work, turning your 'water' into 'wine'. Trust that He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion.

Day 5: Christ Meets Our Deepest Needs

Reading: Philippians 4:19-20

Devotional:

The miracle at Cana reveals Jesus' concern for human needs, even those that might seem trivial. He didn't just meet the need, He exceeded it, providing wine of superior quality in abundance. This points to a greater truth - God cares about every aspect of our lives and is able to meet our needs beyond what we can imagine.

Paul assures us that God will meet all our needs according to the riches of His glory in Christ Jesus. This promise isn't just about material provision, but encompasses our emotional, spiritual, and relational needs as well.

Reflect on your deepest needs today. Are you lacking peace, purpose, or direction? Do you need healing, forgiveness, or restoration? Bring these needs to God, trusting in His promise to provide. Remember, just as Jesus provided abundantly at the wedding, He is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine in our lives.
