Opening Prayer

Key Takeaways:

- 1. Society breaks down when God is removed from government, schools, and families.

- 5. The pastor emphasizes the importance of confessing sin quickly. Why is this crucial, and what are some practical ways we can cultivate a habit of regular confession?
- 6. How can we maintain hope and faith when experiencing God's discipline or when witnessing the moral decline of society?

Practical Applications:

- 1. Commit to daily prayer for our nation, leaders, and society, using 2 Chronicles 7:14 as a guide.
- 2. Identify an area in your life where you may have pushed God to a lower priority. Make a plan to reorient that area around God's will.
- 3. Practice immediate confession of sin this week. Consider finding an accountability partner to help you in this process.
- 4. Look for opportunities to be "salt and light" in your workplace, neighborhood, or social circles this week.
- 5. Memorize Micah 7:8 as a reminder of God's faithfulness during times of discipline or darkness.

Encourage group members to reflect on the shepherd and sheep story throughout the week, considering how God might be using difficult circumstances to draw them closer to Him.
