Small Group Guide: Blessed Are Those Who Mourn

Opening Prayer

Key Takeaways:

- 1. Mourning is a present and future reality for believers, but comfort is promised.
- 2. There are different types of mourning: over personal sin, the state of the world, and loss.
- 3. Grieving can lead to wisdom and spiritual growth when approached with faith.
- 4. Jesus empathizes with our grief and offers ultimate comfort.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. What stood out to you most from the sermon? Why?
- 2. The pastor mentioned that "blessed are those who mourn" seems contradictory. How do you understand this paradox in light of the sermon?
- 3. How does mourning over our own sin differ from worldly sorrow? Why is this distinction important?
- 4. The sermon touched on asking "what" instead of "why" in times of grief. How might this change in perspective affect how we process difficult situations?
- 5. How does Jesus' response to Lazarus' death (John 11) inform our understanding of God's perspective on human grief?
- 6. Discuss the quote: "Till sin be bitter, Christ will not be sweet." How does this relate to our spiritual growth?
- 7. How can we balance mourning over sin and the state of the world with the joy we have in Christ?
- 8. In what ways does the promise of future comfort (Revelation 21:4) impact how we face challenges today?

Practical Applications:

- 1. This week, practice asking "what is God teaching me?" instead of "why is this happening?" when facing difficulties.
- 2. Take time to reflect on areas of sin in your life. Confess these to God and a trusted friend, focusing on God's forgiveness and desire for your growth.
- 3. Reach out to someone you know who is grieving. Offer comfort and share the hope we have in Christ.
- 4. Meditate on Revelation 21:4 daily. How does this promise change your perspective on current struggles?
- 5. As a group, discuss ways you can support each other in times of mourning and how to celebrate moments of comfort and joy together.
