February 24th – Nothing to Fear

"The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the strength of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?"

(Psalm 27:1)

In his 1933 inaugural address, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt said, "We have nothing to fear but fear itself." In the period between WW1 and WW2, and in the wake of the Great Depression, many people were paralyzed with fear because of economic instability. As a result, many Americans started withdrawing their money from the banks, further endangering the American economy. FDR's words were a plea for everyone to set aside their fears and stay the course.

Many Americans could use to hear the former President's admonition about 100 years later. The folks we encounter are afraid of many things. "Are my children safe when I send them to school?
