The Christian view of humanity holds that a human being is a creature of God, **made in the image of God**. This contrasts with contemporary views of humanity. The doctrine of humanity can provide us with a great opportunity to **dialogue** with the non-Christian world.

Three False Views of Humanity

- 1. Humans as **machines** human value comes from what they are able to do
- 2. Humans as **animals** there is no qualitative difference between humans and animals
- 3. Humans as **pawns** of the universe everything affecting humans is beyond their control

The Christian View of Humanity

- Humans have been created in the image of a Triune God (Gen. 1:26).
- As such, human purpose is not found in what brings glory to humans. Human purpose is found in what brings glory to their Maker.
- Various ideas about human creation abound. In fact, one's entire worldview is shaped by what they believe about the creation of humans. Some worldviews are **atheistic**, others **theistic**, and others that attempt to strike a synthesis between the two (progressive creationism approaches such as theistic evolution, etc.)
- The Christian view of humanity will always be grounded in <u>the faithful interpretation of</u> <u>God's Word</u>. For that reason, ideas of progressive creationism are to be rejected.

The Image of God

- The Bible is very clear that **humans alone** have been created in God's image.
- Biblical passages Gen. 1:26-27, 5:1, 9:6, 1 Cor. 11:7, James 3:9
- Three Prominent Views of the Image of God
 - <u>Substantive View</u> the image of God is some definite characteristic or quality within the makeup of the human. It is something we are rather than something we have or do.
 - <u>Relational View</u> the image of God is **the relationship** we have with God, whether it be positive or negative (Brunner and Barth).
 - <u>Functional View</u> the image of God is bound in **something we do**, specifically that we exercise dominion over all of creation.
- Of all the views, we should lean to the substantive because the image of God is not just something we experience or do it is **who we are**.
