Where is history going and why? These are questions which confront all thinking persons and which crucially affect their way of life. Christianity's answer is that **God has a plan** which includes everything that occurs, and that He is now at work carrying out that plan.

Biblical Conclusions Concerning the Plan of God

- 1. God's plan is from all eternity. Psalm 139:16, Eph. 1:4, Isa. 22:11
 - a. Has it occurred to us that **nothing** has EVER occurred to God? His plan is eternal.
- 2. God's plan and the decisions contained therein are free on God's part. Isa. 40:13-14
- 3. The ultimate purpose of God's plan is God's glory. Eph. 1:5-6, Matt. 5:16, 1 Cor. 10:31
- 4. The plan of God is all-inclusive; no detail has been left out. Eph. 1:11, Psalm 119:91
- 5. What God has planned from eternity will surely come to pass. Isa. 14:24, 27
 - a. Consequently, God will not change His mind or discover any unknown concepts.
- 6. God's plan is consistent with His nature.
- 7. Creating, preserving, directing, and redeeming are essential parts of God's plan.
- 8. Human actions are included in the plan of God. (e.g. Christ's betrayal and crucifixion)
- 9. The plan of God is unchangeable. Any change would indicate an imperfect plan.

Logical Priority: God's Plan or Human Action?

- Historically this question has been answered in one of two ways:
 - Calvinism argues that God's plan is logically prior, and that human decisions & actions are a consequence of His perfect plan.
 - Arminianism places a higher value on human freedom. Thus, some would say that human action is a precursor to God's plan.
- Erickson's approach: A Moderately Calvinistic Model
 - In a nutshell, Erickson says that humans have freedom, but that their freedom is limited by the plan of God. ("God rendered it certain...I would freely move" p. 126)
 - Question: If humans have any freedom, can it still be said that God is sovereign?

God's Wish and God's Will (aka. Perfect Will and Permissive Will)

- God's perfect will God's perfect standard for all mankind (Garden of Eden)
- God's permissive will That which God permits to happen (forbidden fruit)
- God's plan includes both the ends & the means He sees the end from the beginning
- A.W. Tozer used **the analogy of a ship** while it sails from one definite point to another, its passengers are free to move about the ship as they will.
- So it is with the sovereignty of God and the free will of man: While God has permitted men to act as they will, He has brought all their movements under the providence of His perfect plan.
