January 6th – God's Covenant with Abraham

"Now the Lord had said to Abram: 'Get out of your country, from your family and from your father's house, to a land that I will show you. I will make you a great nation; I will bless you and make your name great; and you shall be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and I will curse him who curses you; and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed."

(Gen. 12:1-3)

About 3800 years ago, God approached a man named Abram who lived in a city called Ur in region of Mesopotamia. Basically, Abram lived with his family in the modern-day land of Iraq. In his sermon from Acts 7, Stephen tells us that Abram was called by God to leave his family and follow the leadership of the Lord.
