Gun Control Hot Summer Nights

Intro – Monday Fox News Headline

- "Federal judge upholds Oregon gun control law described as 'nation's **most extreme'**". They also reported that "Gun rights activists are **appealing** the decision to the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals."
- Last Friday's ruling found that Oregon's law is in line with the Second Amendment because it is in keeping with a U.S. tradition of "regulating uniquely dangerous features of weapons and firearms to protect public safety."
- Oregon's Measure 114 **bans large capacity magazines** and requires residents to *obtain a permit before purchasing firearms*.
- The law does not affect large-capacity magazines already owned by state residents, but it restricts those gun owners from taking those firearms **outside their home** for any reason other than gun range practice, shooting competitions, or hunting.
- The Oregon Firearms Association, which first sued arguing the law was unconstitutional, expressed **outrage** at the ruling in a statement posted to their website. (see quote below)
- "Today, Judge Karin Immergut ruled against gun owners, the Second Amendment and a basic understanding of the English language...simple nonsense and sure to be overturned."
- These headlines are constant as the **debate over gun control** continues to **rage** in our culture.

1. What is gun control?

- Gun control, or firearms regulation, is the set of laws or policies that regulate the manufacture, sale, transfer, possession, modification, or use of firearms by civilians.
- Most countries have relatively restrictive firearms laws, with only a few being categorized as permissive, such as Switzerland and the Scandinavian countries.
- Jurisdictions that regulate private access to firearms typically first restrict ownership of certain categories of firearms, and may then make further restrictions of the categories of persons who may be granted a license to own or carry.
- In some countries, such as the United States, gun control may be implemented at any of the **federal**, **state**, **or local** levels.
- The term "gun control" itself is considered **politicized**. Many gun control advocates prefer the use of terms like "gun-violence prevention", "gun safety", or "common-sense regulation" to describe their objectives.
- In 2007, a global supply of 875 million small arms were estimated to be in the hands of civilians, law enforcement agencies, and national armed forces. Of these firearms, 650 million, or 75%, were estimated to be held by civilians.
- U.S. civilians account for 270 million small arms. About 200 million are controlled by military forces. Law enforcement agencies have 26 million small arms. Gangs possess about 2 in every 10.

2. Who is advocating for gun control?

- After the massacre of schoolchildren at Sandy Hook Elementary in Newtown, Conn., in 2012, the gun-control movement was **small and badly outspent** by the National Rifle Association.
- Parents seeking an outlet for their grief and rage congregated on **Facebook**, where they formed their own group, **Moms Demand Action**, to push for stricter gun laws.
- By far the most significant and best-known donor in the years since has been **Michael Bloomberg**, the billionaire and former New York City mayor.
- In 2013, his mayors' initiative merged with Moms Demand Action to create Everytown for Gun Safety, the closest thing that the gun-control movement has to a counterweight to the N.R.A. – they spent \$36.5 million in 2013 alone.
- Since then, more groups have sprung up, including **Giffords**, started in 2013 by former Representative Gabrielle Giffords, who was nearly killed in a mass shooting in Tucson, Ariz.
- Another group called "March for Our Lives," was founded by survivors of the 2018 school shooting in Parkland, Fla. Advocacy has peaked in the wake of several mass & school shootings.
- Advocates say that gun sales & gun deaths have risen in tandem, and that the number of mass shootings continues to increase, including more recently in Buffalo, Uvalde, & Nashville.
- In the wake of those tragedies, **large donors** have started supporting gun control legislation.

3. Who is opposed to gun control?

- The number one gun rights organization in America is the National Rifle Association (NRA). In 2022, they donated nearly \$6 million to the campaigns of gun rights candidates.
- The number one gun rights lobbying group in America is the National Shooting Sports Foundation. In 2022, they spent nearly \$5 million lobbying Congress to protect gun rights.
- The primary goal of all gun ownership advocacy groups is to **protect the 2nd Amendment of the Constitution**, which says, "A well-regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed."
- Gun rights advocates see weapon possession as a matter of individual rights. They say that people have the right to arm themselves for <u>hunting, self-</u> <u>defense, sport</u> – or just because they want to.
- In 2008, the Supreme Court ruled for the first time, in a 5-to-4 decision, that the Second Amendment protects **an individual's right** to keep and bear firearms. Even so, debates continue to rage on what sorts of limitations on that right are allowable.
- Gun owners argue that weapons actually make society **safer**, giving people the power of self-defense, and dissuading criminals from victimizing people who might be armed. In particular, they say that an armed citizen can stop **a mass shooter**.
- 4. Does gun control work?

- If you ask gun control advocates this question, they'll obviously say YES. If you ask gun rights advocates this question, they'll say NO. But which group is correct, or is the truth in the middle?
- **The RAND Corporation** is a non-partisan American nonprofit global policy think tank and research institute that conducts research and development in multiple fields and industries.
- They found that POLICIES REGULATING WHO MAY LEGALLY OWN, PURCHASE, OR POSSESS FIREARMS – such as minimum age requirements – had very little to no effect on gun use outcomes.
- They also found that POLICIES REGULATING FIREARM SALES AND TRANSFERS – such as background checks and safety training requirements – had very little to no effect.
- BUT they did find that POLICIES REGULATING THE LEGAL USE, STORAGE, OR CARRYING OF FIREARMS – such as Child-Access Prevention Laws – had a much more significant effect on gun use outcomes.
- Thus, objective research seems to indicate that gun control measures aren't as effective as one might hope in protecting our citizens from gun violence. But WHY?
- Sadly, it's because **criminals don't obey laws**. You can require dealers to run background checks, but criminals don't buy from dealers. You can try to implement gun-free zones, but most criminals will disregard those restrictions.

- 5. What is the Christian response to gun control?
 - First and foremost, Christians stand against all forms of violence (with the exception of just war principles). We believe in protecting our fellow man and prosecuting lawbreakers.
 - <u>Rom. 13:4</u> "if you do evil, be afraid; for he (the governing authority) does not bear the sword in vain; for he is God's minister, an avenger to execute wrath on him who practices evil."
 - <u>The Golden Rule</u> "whatever you want men to do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets" (Matt. 7:12) – requires that we do all we can to **protect others** from violence and crime.
 - As we work to protect others, we must avoid the temptation to infringe upon their rights and privileges. We need to realize that our forefathers wrote the 2nd amendment for a reason.
 - Protecting the rights of our fellow Americans to keep and bear arms is right, because it preserves their ability to protect themselves from potential threats – intruders, robbers, tyranny, etc.
 - Christians are also honest, and thus we need to honestly admit that many gun control measures don't work. In fact, many are counter-productive – they disarm law-abiding citizens, thus empowering criminals to commit violent crime.
 - We must work together to enact some responsible, common-sense, & effective gun ownership measures that actually work. BUT, we must keep our focus on the criminal rather than the weapon. Violence is a problem ONLY GOD can fix!
