"It is true that in the rest of Scripture Sodom is connected also with a number of other sins: Isa. 1:9,10 and 3:9 connect it with blatant indulgence in all kinds of iniquity; Jeremiah 23:14 with lying and adultery; and Ezekiel 16:49 with pride and prosperity combined with the neglect of the poor. But all these texts display the same spectrum of iniquity that Romans 1 describes, in which sexual sins are only part of the larger pattern of corruption in the pagan world. Sodom was not destroyed because it specialized in homosexuality, but because it was a plague center of every kind of depravity, including pride, sensuality, and injustice." – James Boice

But disbelief-failure to trust in Jesus? That's not even on some people's list. Well, it's on Jesus list, at the very top! A contemporary comparison would be a person who grows up in a country where Christianity is prominent or at least normative (e.g., the USA!), has been surrounded by the gospel taught and lived out at church and homes by Christian parents and others, and yet rejects the saving grace of God. Perhaps this describes you. Be warned. It is not trivial matter to know so much and not believe." - Douglas O' Donnell
