
Jesus' growing resume'

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The phrase Mary's Son was also derogatory since a man was not described as his mother's son in Jewish usage even if she was a widow, except by insult (cf. Jud. 11:1–2; John 8:41; 9:29). Their words, calculated insults, also suggested they knew there was something unusual about Jesus' birth.

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<u>The population of Nazareth</u> when Jesus was born was likely between 100 and 400 people, though some estimates are **as low as 120-150** and others **as high as 1,000**. It was **a small, insignificant farming village, Jesus' father <u>a Craftsmen</u> (nearby Safed) located away from major trade routes, and these population estimates reflect its status as a small community during the Roman and**

Hellenistic periods.

Population estimates:

Archaeological evidence suggests a population of no more than 400 people, while other sources estimate it was between 100 and 150


<u>Bethlehem</u> - The population of Bethlehem when Jesus was born was likely small, with estimates ranging from a few hundred to around 1,000 people. Some scholars, like <u>William F. Albright</u>, estimate the population to be as low as 300 people, consistent with a small, out-of-the-way village at the time. Other estimates place the figure higher, between 1,000 and 3,000 people, reflecting the uncertainty surrounding ancient population data. <u>Likely a Shepherding community!</u>


The population of Capernaum in Jesus' time was estimated to be between 1,000 and 1,500 people. It was a bustling fishing village located on the northern shore of the Sea of Galilee, which was larger than Jesus' hometown of Nazareth and was a hub for trade and fishing.

[Hos 11:1 ESV] 1 When Israel was a child, I loved him, and out of Egypt I called my son.

[Exo 4:22 ESV] 22 Then you shall say to Pharaoh, 'Thus says the LORD, Israel is my firstborn son,

[Mat 2:15 ESV] 15 and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet, "Out of Egypt I called my son."





Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary..?

- A carpenter (Mark 6:3), & a carpenter's son (Matthew 13:55)
- (tekton) could also be translated more broadly as "artisan", "contractor", or "handyman".
- They asserted His mere humanity, He is Ordinary!

Thus since the townspeople could not explain Jesus, they took offense (from skandalizomai, "to be caused to stumble, to be repelled"; cf. comments on Mark 14:27) at Him

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Jesus was a Blue collar, Tradesman, worked with his hands, Physical work! NOT Scholarly work

We also delight in knowing the craftsmanship, attention to detail, work specific to the task, unique! Personal attention!

Josh MCDowell, Wrote a book. He was an abused son who rejected Jesus and went to disprove him as merely a carpenter and was transformed. We have some!! Please take one!

Mat 13:55-56 Is not this the carpenter's son? Is not his mother called Mary? And are not his brothers James and Joseph and Simon and Judas? 56 And are not all his sisters with us? Where then did this man get all these things?"


Luk 4:22 And all spoke well of him and marveled at the gracious words that were coming from his mouth. And they said, "Is not this Joseph's son?"

Jhn 6:42 They said, "Is not this Jesus, the son of Joseph, whose father and mother we know? How does he now say, 'I have come down from heaven'?"

Unremarkable! Uneducated.

Jhn 7:15 The Jews therefore marveled, saying, "How is it that this man has learning, when he has never studied?" (Uneducated)

They took offense at him.

- "A prophet is not without honor, except in his hometown and among his relatives and in his own household."
- Despised & rejected by men, a man of sorrows
 Isaiah 53:3
- John 1:11 He came to his own, and his own people did not receive him.

Familiarity breeds contempt!

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Act 4:13 Now when they saw the boldness of Peter and John, and perceived that they were uneducated, common men, they were astonished. And they recognized that they had been with Jesus.

Jhn 7:46 The officers answered, "No one ever spoke like this man!"

Mat 7:28-29 And when Jesus finished these sayings, the crowds were astonished at his teaching, 29 for he was teaching them as one who had authority, and not as their scribes.

Mat 22:22, 33 When they heard it, they marveled. And they left him and went away. ... 33 And when the crowd heard it, they were astonished at his teaching.

Luk 2:47 And all who heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers.

Mat 13:54 and coming to his hometown he taught them in their synagogue, so that they were astonished, and said, "Where did this man get this wisdom and these mighty works?







The website Blue Letter Bible has compiled <u>exhaustive lists</u> of all of Jesus's references to Old Testament books. There find 102 such references in Matthew, 39 in Mark, 68 in Luke, and 49 in John. That's 258 references total. How many of these come from Genesis? The answer is 18. That means that 7% of all of Jesus' references to the Old Testament were references to Genesis.

It has been estimated that over one-tenth of Jesus' recorded New Testament words were taken from the Old Testament. In the four Gospels, 180 of the 1,800 verses that report His discourses are either Old Testament quotes or Old Testament allusions.

He quoted the Old Testament 78 times, the Pentateuch alone 26 times. He quoted from Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Deuteronomy, Psalms, Proverbs, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, Daniel, Hosea, Amos, Jonah, Micah, and Malachi. He referred to the Old Testament as "The Scriptures," "the word of God," and "the wisdom of God." The apostles quoted 209 times from the Old Testament and considered it "the oracles of God." The Old Testament in hundreds of places predicted the events of the New Testament; and as the New Testament is the fulfillment of, and testifies to the genuineness and authenticity of the Old Testament, both Testaments must be considered together as the Word of God.

In his teachings alone, Jesus has over 300 quotes or references to the OT. Almost everything Jesus taught was build directly on something in the OT. It was the base for all his teachings.

In his gospel alone Matthew as over 90 quotes or direct references to the OT (outside of the references in the teachings of Jesus that he records.)

Almost all of the direct quotes are taken from the Septuagint Greek translation of the OT, since the NT was written Greek.

Jesus Is the Question: The 307 Questions Jesus Asked and the 3 He

Contrary to some common assumptions, Jesus is not the ultimate Answer Man, but more like the Great Questioner. In the Gospels Jesus asks many more questions than he answers.

To be precise, Jesus asks 307 questions. He is asked 183 of which he only answers 3. Asking questions was central to Jesus' life and teachings. In fact, for every question he answers directly he asks—literally—a hundred. Jesus is the Question considers the questions Jesus asks—what they tell us about Jesus and, more important, what our responses might say about what it means to follow Him. Through Jesus' questions, he modeled the struggle, the wondering, the thinking it through that helps us draw closer to God and better understand, not just the answer, but ourselves, our process and ultimately why questions are among Jesus' most profound gifts for a life of faith. A game-changer of a book.





Notice how the One Solitary Life and Greatest Man in History summary's focus on His teaching, not so much miracles

And he marveled because of their unbelief.

- Mark 6:5 And he could do no mighty work there,
 except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and
 healed them. (Matthew 13:58) because of unbelief
- Jesus marveled at the rejection of the Jews!
- Unbelief is an egregious sin! It opposes much evidence!

Even Jesus was amazed (ethaumasen, "astonished"; cf. 5:20; 12:17; 15:5, 44) at their unbelief Just as He had marveled at faith (Matt. 8:10), Jesus now marveled at unbelief.

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
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
Mat 13:58 ESV] 58 And he did not do many mighty works there, because of their unbelief.


Context in contrast! - Mark 6:7-13

- While Jesus' hometown tries to execute Him, Jesus' disciples are appointed Apostles to serve him!
- What/Who would you Die For? Their Teachings?
- They will not listen to you, when you leave, shake off the dust!
- Mark 6:12 So they went out and proclaimed that people should repent.

The third major section of Mark's Gospel begins structurally like the first two sections (cf. 6:6b with 1:14–15 and 3:7–12; 6:7–34 with 1:16–20 and 3:13–19), but concludes with Peter's confession of Jesus as Messiah (8:27–30) instead of a statement of rejection (cf. 3:6; 6:1–6a). During this phase of His ministry Jesus directed more attention to His disciples. In the face of opposition, He revealed to them by both words and deeds who He really is. Much of this time was spent outside of Galilee.

Apostate or Apostle?




The hometown crowd turns on him...

- On this occasion, however, the amazement immediately turned negative as the crowd vocalized a series of questions that led them to the issue of Jesus' own origins. And, they — hometown folk — seemed to know all too well from where he came. If anyone had the right to question Jesus' origins, it should be those who knew him best. Their description of him as "the carpenter," "the son of Mary," ignored any mention of a father figure.
- So, they know a lot about his family. This information would be a direct insult on Jesus' character, his honor, in first century culture, hinting at one who was conceived illegitimately. This type of history, with a fatherless lineage, would be "scandalous" to them. Unlike Matthew and Luke who cleaned it up, Mark did not alter the tradition and include a father (cf. Matthew 13:53-58; Luke 4:16-30). Rather, the tension between Jesus and his family or hometown was an on-going sub-plot of the story (cf. 3:20-21).










