GROUPS

GETTING TO KNOW YOU

- Icebreaker Highs and Lows | Have each person in the group briefly share their best ("high") and worst ("low") moments from the previous week. If a group member needs additional time to talk through a low moment they're experiencing, be intentional as a group to listen to and care for this person.
- 2. What has your engagement with the local church (be it Rivers Crossing or another church) looked like during COVID-19? Are you continuing to watch online or have you begun attending in-person services? Recently, have you found it easier or more difficult to connect with God at church? Explain your answer.

What impact, if any, has COVID-19 and its restrictions had on your view of church and the importance of routinely gathering with a local body of believers?

DIVING DEEPER

3. As a Community Group, read Malachi 1:6-8 and discuss the corresponding questions.

Malachi 1:6-8 (NLT) – ⁶"...A son honors his father, and a servant respects his master. If I am your father and master, where are the honor and respect I deserve? You have shown contempt for my name! "But you ask, 'How have we ever shown contempt for your name?' ⁷"You have shown contempt by offering defiled sacrifices on my altar. "Then you ask, 'How have we defiled the sacrifices?' "You defile them by saying the altar of the Lord deserves no respect. ⁸When you give blind animals as sacrifices, isn't that wrong? And isn't it wrong to offer animals that are crippled and diseased? Try giving gifts like that to your governor, and see how pleased he is!" says the Lord of Heaven's Armies.

God's instruction to the Israelites for worshipping and encountering His presence involved offering unblemished sacrifices (see Deuteronomy 17:1, Leviticus 22:24). But as Malachi describes, the Israelites neglected God's instructions and were simply going through the motions.

- a) Do you ever struggle with going through the motions or insincerity when it comes to worshipping God? If so, what does this look like? How might the familiarity of corporate worship lead us, if we aren't careful, into a place where our worship actually dishonors God?
- b) How do you (or can you) overcome the familiarity of corporate worship to routinely encounter God?
- 4. Since Jesus fulfilled the Old Testament sacrificial system (see Hebrews 10:19-22), God's primary concern for how to worship Him is the posture of our heart. Read the following Bibles passages together and discuss the corresponding questions.

Isaiah 8:11-14 (NLT) – ¹¹The Lord has given me a strong warning not to think like everyone else does. He said, ¹²"Don't call everything a conspiracy, like they do, and don't live in dread of what frightens them. ¹³Make the Lord of Heaven's Armies holy in your life. He is the one you should fear. He is the one who should make you tremble. ¹⁴He will keep you safe.

Psalm 43:3-5 (NLT) – ³Send out your light and your truth; let them guide me. Let them lead me to your holy mountain, to the place where you live. ⁴There I will go to the altar of God, to God—the source of all my joy. I will praise you with my harp, O God, my God! ⁵Why am I discouraged? Why is my heart so sad? I will put my hope in God! I will praise him again—my Savior and my God!

Psalm 42:1-4 (NLT) – ¹As the deer longs for streams of water, so I long for you, O God. ²I thirst for God, the living God. When can I go and stand before him? ³Day and night I have only tears for food, while my enemies continually taunt me, saying, "Where is this God of yours?" ⁴My heart is breaking as I remember how it used to be: I walked among the crowds of worshipers, leading a great procession to the house of God, singing for joy and giving thanks amid the sound of a great celebration!

- a) What elements of this heart posture do you find in the verses above? Why do all of these elements matter when it comes to honoring God with our worship?
- b) How do you (or can you) monitor the posture of your heart when preparing to worship God?
- 5. Corporate worship of God as a church should overflow into personal worship of God in our daily lives. How does this work out in your life? Do you see personal worship as being limited to worship music, or is it more than that? Where might God be calling you to grow in offering yourself as a "living sacrifice?"

Romans 12:1 (NLT) – And so, dear brothers and sisters, I plead with you to give your bodies to God because of all he has done for you. Let them be a living and holy sacrifice — the kind he will find acceptable. This is truly the way to worship him.

6. What financial lessons have you learned during this period of COVID-19?

Proverbs 3:9-10 (NLT) – ⁹Honor the Lord with your wealth and with the best part of everything you produce. ¹⁰Then he will fill your barns with grain, and your vats will overflow with good wine.

Why is it dishonoring to God to neglect financially contributing to the local church you call home? How can you either go deeper with or begin honoring God with your finances?
