Bold Faith [A Touch Of Faith] Discussion Guide

Summary

In this sermon, Jonathan concludes a series on bold faith by examining the connection between our words and our hearts. Using the story of the woman with the issue of blood from Mark 5, he highlights how Jesus intentionally asked who touched Him not because He didn't know, but to give the woman an opportunity to publicly confess her faith. Jonathan emphasizes that when we truly believe something in our hearts, it naturally comes out in our words, drawing from 2 Corinthians 4:13 and Romans 10:9.

Intro Prayer

Heavenly Father, as we gather to discuss Your Word today, we thank You for the powerful connection between our faith and our words. Open our hearts to understand how our speech reflects what we truly believe. Help us to be bold in our faith, not just believing in our hearts but also speaking out with confidence. Ice Breaker

Share about a time when you were so excited about something new in your life (like a purchase, achievement, or good news) that you couldn't help telling everyone about it.

Questions

- Jonathan mentioned that 'what comes out of our mouth is a reflection of what's in our hearts.' How have you seen this principle at work in your own life?
- In the story of the woman with the issue of blood, why
 do you think Jesus wanted her to publicly acknowledge
 what had happened rather than just letting her walk
 away healed?
- Romans 10:9 says, 'If you openly declare that Jesus is your Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.' How does this verse connect our inner beliefs with our outward confession?
- The sermon highlighted that 'when God's doing something for you, it's not just for you.' Can you share an example of how God used your testimony to help someone else?
- Proverbs 18:21 states that 'the tongue can bring death or life.' What are some practical ways we can be more intentional about speaking life rather than death?
- What makes it difficult sometimes to speak openly about our faith or what God has done in our lives?
- Jonathan quoted Psalm 118:17: 'I will not die. Instead, I will live to tell what the Lord has done.' How might this verse encourage someone going through a difficult season?

 How might our church community grow stronger if we were all more willing to share our testimonies of God's work in our lives?

Life Application

This week, challenge yourself to intentionally speak life in two ways: First, identify one area in your own life where you've been speaking negative words or doubt, and replace those words with declarations of faith based on Scripture. Second, share with at least one person a specific testimony of something God has done in your life. Notice how speaking out your faith not only strengthens your own belief but potentially impacts others as well.
