

Kingdom Logic [Lose Your Life To Find It] Discussion Guide

Summary

This sermon explores the biblical paradox that to truly live, we must die to ourselves. Using agricultural imagery of a seed that must die to produce life, Jonathan explains how Jesus calls us to surrender our self-centered living to discover authentic, abundant life in Him. The message challenges the world's wisdom of self-preservation and self-advancement, showing instead that genuine freedom, community, and purpose come through surrendering our lives to Christ. This isn't about losing everything, but about trading temporary, empty pursuits for eternal, meaningful life that reflects God's nature.

Intro Prayer

Heavenly Father, we come before You this morning carrying our lives, our ambitions, our fears, and our carefully guarded dreams. Your Word calls us to something the world considers foolish... finding life through surrender. Open our hearts to embrace this profound spiritual reality. Help us release our grip on what we cling to so tightly and give us courage to trust that what You ask us to release, You replace with something infinitely more valuable. Questions

- What does it practically mean to 'lose your life' for Christ's sake in today's world?
- How does our culture's emphasis on self-preservation conflict with Jesus' teaching about dying to ourselves?
- What are some specific areas in your life where you struggle to surrender control to God?
- How can we distinguish between the temporary life and eternal life that Jesus describes?
- What fears or pride issues keep us from fully embracing this paradox of losing our life to find it?
- How have you seen examples of people who found greater fulfillment through serving others rather than serving themselves?
- What would it look like for you to 'take up your cross daily' in your current circumstances?
- How does understanding that God honors those who serve Him change your perspective on sacrifice and surrender?

Life Application

This week, identify one area where you've been holding tightly to control or self-interest. Practice surrendering this area to God through prayer and intentional choices that prioritize His will over your comfort or convenience. Look for opportunities to serve others without expecting anything in return, remembering that true life comes through losing ourselves in service to Christ.
