We are looking at each component of the definition of discipleship. But first, let's review the definition. Discipleship is the process of allowing the Holy Spirit to shape you as you strive to become more like Christ by taking on His attitude and behaviors, and then sharing with others how this process is changing you.

This week, we are looking at becoming more like Christ by taking on His behaviors. So what does it mean to take on the behaviors of Christ?

It means that our actions should match Jesus' actions. Our behavior should resemble His behavior. But as a side note, before we get into the Lord's behavior, please know that God is not only concerned with our behavior, He also cares about our motives.

One behavior that Jesus taught us was to look for people who are hurting. I love what Jesus said in Luke 5:31–32, "Healthy people don't need a doctor—sick people do.

Another behavior that Jesus modeled for us that we need to serve others. Jesus, Himself said that in Mark 10:25, He did not come to be served, but to serve and die for others.

He wanted to make our life better. Jesus said in John 10:10 that His purpose is to give people a rich and satisfying life.

Help people who are hurting, Serve other people, and lastly, we talked about how Jesus wanted to help others have a better life.
