Jericho's Wall: Victory in the Lord Joshua 5-6

I. Consecration and Alignment (Joshua 5:2-15)

- A. Significance of Circumcision
 - 1. More than a ritual; symbolizes inner transformation and dedication to God.
 - 2. Importance of aligning hearts with God's will and embracing spiritual renewal (Rom 2:28-29).
- B. Meeting the Captain of the Lord's Army

1. Parallels with Jesus as the ultimate authority and leader of God's people (Matt 12:30).

2. Emphasis on surrendering to God's will and seeking alignment with His purposes.

C. Living a Sanctified Life:

- 2. Implications of God's power in instilling fear in opposition.
- B. Jericho's Formidable Defense
 - 1. Jericho was a stronghold, integral to Canaan's defense system.
 - 2. Jericho was 400 square feet; but was difficult to defeat because of its walls.
- C. Living in the Power of God

1. Contrast between human prowess and divine intervention for victory (Matt 19:26).

2. Illustrating God's strength shining through human weakness (2 Cor 12:9).

3. Remembering that God has not given us a spirit of fear but of power, love, and a sound mind (2 Tim 1:7).

III. Strategy in Obedience (Joshua 6:12-20)

A. Destruction of Jericho

1. Significance of Jericho as a formidable stronghold and the necessity of divine intervention.

- 2. Implications of obedience and trust in God's wisdom.
- B. Understanding Jericho's Significance
 - 1. Identifying personal strongholds hindering spiritual growth.
 - 2. Surrendering barriers to God's power for victory.
- C. Trust and Obey

 - 1. Encouragement to persevere amidst trials, anchored in God's faithfulness.
 - 2. God is faithful to do what he said he would do (Heb 10:23)
 - a. Defeated Jericho.
 - b. Brought safety to Rahab.
- C. Identify with Christ and His victory.
 - 1. Reflecting on our union with Christ and His victory over sin and death (Gal 2:20).

2. Drawing strength from our identity in Christ to persevere through trials and challenges, knowing that we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us (Rom 8:37).
