Here's a 5-day Bible reading plan and devotional guide based on the themes from the transcription:

Day 1: Victory in the Valley Reading: Psalm 23:1-6 Devotional: The valley can be a place of fear and darkness, but as we learn from Psalm 23, it's also where we experience God's presence most profoundly. Today, reflect on the valleys in your life - those challenging circumstances that seem overwhelming. Remember that just as the pastor emphasized, "Victory is in the valley." God doesn't promise to airlift us out of difficult situations, but He does promise to walk with us through them. How can you shift your perspective to see your current struggles as opportunities for growth and deeper faith? Take time to thank God for His constant presence, even in your darkest moments.

Day 2: Facing Your Giants Reading: 1 Samuel 17:32-50 Devotional: The story of David and Goliath reminds us that with God, we can face seemingly insurmountable odds. The sermon mentioned that "David defeated Goliath in the valley." What are the Goliaths in your life - those problems that appear too big to overcome? Remember that your circumstance, no matter how huge, "can't kill you, can't destroy you." Today, identify your biggest challenge and, like David, approach it with confidence in God's power rather than fear of its size. How can you take one step of faith towards confronting this challenge?

Day 3: The Presence of God in Darkness Reading: Isaiah 43:1-3 Devotional: The pastor emphasized that we shouldn't be "afraid of the darkness" because Jesus is with us. Isaiah 43 beautifully illustrates God's promise to be with us through waters and fires - metaphors for life's trials. Reflect on a time when you felt God's presence in a difficult situation. How did it change your experience? Today, practice being aware of God's presence, especially in moments that feel dark or challenging. How might continually acknowledging His presence change your approach to daily struggles?

Day 4: Praising Through the Pain Reading: Acts 16:16-34 Devotional: The sermon encouraged us to "praise your way through" the valley. Paul and Silas exemplified this when they sang hymns in prison. It's easy to praise God when everything is going well, but true

faith is demonstrated when we worship in our worst moments. Today, challenge yourself to find reasons to praise God, especially if you're going through a difficult time. How can you cultivate an attitude of gratitude and praise, regardless of your circumstances? Remember, "Joy is in the valley" - can you choose joy today?

Day 5: From Valley to Victory Reading: Romans 8:31-39 Devotional: The pastor reminded us that the valley is not our final destination - it's a path to promotion and growth. Romans 8 assures us that nothing can separate us from God's love, and that we are "more than conquerors" through Christ. As you conclude this devotional series, reflect on how your perspective on trials has changed. How has your faith grown? Remember, "You're going to get promoted in the valley." What spiritual lessons have you learned through recent challenges? Take time to thank God for His faithfulness and the victory He promises, even when it's not yet visible.
